A Boat 4,500 Years Old.

A Viking boat found in Norway some 4,500 years old was in use about the year 1000 A. D., and at once became famous as by far the oldest specimen of watercraft in existence. The boat is the Gokul monument, it was decided by the learned, were used at least 4,500 years ago, and were contemporaneous with the Dashur pyramids of the eleventh Egyptian dynasty.

This boat and the two which remain in the Cairo museum were two more, which still rest in the sands which stretch desolately from the Dashur pyramids, near which they were found.

The five boats were found buried at a considerable depth, not far from the famous largest pyramid, and in such orderly form and with such mathematical relationship to the great pile of stone that it was evident that they had been buried with design at that particular spot.

The boats were found to be alike in the material of which they were constructed and in their general dimensions. The cedar of antiquity, which entered into so much of the construction of things of wood, was used in building these boats.

While the equipments of the boats had generally disappeared with time, their shapely outlines still remained.

The boat that is in Chicago now was probably better preserved than any. It is 30 feet long, 8 feet of beam and 4 feet of hold. A well preserved and peculiarly marked and designed piece of wood of wood was found near the boats—Harper's Round Table.

The Arminian Race War. Little Rock, Ark., June 2.—The excitement in Pope county over the race riots which have occurred in Lee township has not abated, but so far as can be learned no further bloodshed has occurred. Officers from Atkins are now on the scene trying to quell the disturbances. The negroes are in a very ugly mood and defy arrest. They are being upheld by a few white men, and as they are armed there may be further rioting when the officers attempt to take those for whom warrants have been issued. A correspondent at Atkins says the situation is even more serious than was at first reported.

American Cricketers in England. Southampton, June 2.—The American five star team, having on board the Philadelphia cricket team, which is to play 15 matches in England, arrived here yesterday. The members of the team say they had a fine passage, and that they are in splendid condition.

Pennsylvania Prohibitionists. Altoona, Pa., June 2.—The Prohibition state convention opened here this morning, and the following temporary officers were chosen: Chairman, James M. Caldwell of Milton; secretaries, S. C. Watts of Clearfield, W. A. Avey of Pittsburgh, Budd Cannon of Milton, J. T. Logan of Wilkesbarre and C. C. Latus of Reading. It is probable that A. A. Stevens, of Tyrone, will head the committee on resolutions.
