President Murphy, of the Health Board, said: "I received thirty communications that had been sent to a newspaper, and I sent them to the Sanitary Superintendent, Dr. Roberts, with instructions that they be sent to the inspectors in the respective districts. I am well pleased with the result of the inspectors' work thus far. The use of soft coal in the metropolitan district will soon be a matter of history. We wish it understood that a violation of this ordinance calls for just as summary measures as the violation of any other ordinance, and we propose to use summary measures if necessary. We will close a factory if necessary to stop the nuisance."
