1863. GETTYSBURG. 1899.

34th Anniversary of the Death of Gen'l Reynolds to be fittingly observed.
Thirty-six years ago on July 1st, Maj. Gen'l John F. Reynolds fell mortally wounded at Gettysburg gallantly leading his troops during the first day of the battle that decided the great civil war, and on the anniversary this year a fine equestrian statue of that noble officer will be unveiled with appropriate ceremonies. The statue, a beautiful piece of work, somewhat similar to those of Generals Meade and Hancock, is situated on the battlefield about a quarter mile north of the spot where Gen'l Reynolds was wounded, and in the design and work of H. K. Rush-Brown. The statue will be unveiled 2 p. m. July 1st by Chas. P. Reynolds, a grand nephew of the famous General. General Goldin will transfer the statue to the site, and it will be received by Governor Stone. Colonel Huidakoper is to deliver the oration.

New York's Santiago Day.
New York, June 21.—The city council yesterday adopted a resolution making July 3 a holiday in this city, in commemoration of the first anniversary of the battle of Santiago.

General Wood Going to Washington.
New York, June 21.—General Leonard Wood will go to Washington to-day to report to the war department. He expects to be in New York again on Saturday. He admitted that he had been offered the presidency of the Washington Traction and Electric Company, but declared he had not yet given the proposition any serious consideration. He would not say, however, that he could not accept the offer provided he can arrange matters as to make an acceptance desirable.

Speedy Regular Passenger Trains.
Chicago, June 21.—A deep cut in the time of passenger trains between Chicago and New York will be made by the Lake Shore and New York Central next Sunday. The run will be covered in just 24 1/2 hours, and a corresponding eastbound flyer will go through in the same time. These trains will be only one-half an hour slower than the 24 hours limited trains operated by the Lake Shore and Pennsylvania roads, and on which an extra fare of \$1 is charged.

Our Philippines Customs Receipts.
Washington, June 21.—The total receipts from all sources at the ports of Manila and Iloilo, for the first four months of 1909, were \$1,414,939. During the same period 399 vessels entered and 480 cleared from the port of Manila, and 87 vessels entered and 77 cleared from Iloilo.

A Tornado in Illinois.
Danville, Ill., June 21.—A tornado passed north of Hoopstown last night and wires are down. Several buildings were blown down at Hoopstown and some stock killed. It is reported that much damage was done at Wellington, five miles north of Hoopstown.
