PRESBYTERY ADJOURNED.

(Continued from First Page.) The health of Mr. Mansfield, preparatory to ordination, was pronounced with. Rev. W. H. Fillion, late of the Presbytery of New Brunswick, N. J., was enrolled as a member of the Lehigh Presbytery.

COMMISSIONERS ELECTED. The Presbytery proceeded to the election of two commissioners to the Synod, which resulted in the election of Rev. Calvin Stewart, of South Easton, and Dr. E. D. Warfield, President of Lafayette College, as Commissioners.

REV. McNAIR RETURNS. On motion of Rev. J. P. Pollock, of Allentown, Rev. W. W. McNaair, of Philadelphia, was placed on the honorable retired list and a direction of certification to the Board of Ministerial Relief made.

TO BE ORDAINED. The vote of the Presbytery on the examinations of Mr. Mansfield, called to the Tamaqua church, was next taken up and the examinations were sustained by a unanimous vote.

REV. EARLE'S LONG SERVICE. A request of Rev. Cornelius Earle, D. D., that his relations with the charge at Catawqua be dissolved, on account of his ill health and advanced age, has been served in the charge for 47 consecutive years.

SPECIAL MEETINGS. It was decided that the Presbytery meet at Easton on October 28th to examine Dr. E. D. Warfield, preparatory to ordination, and at Tamaqua on November 14th to ordain and install Mr. W. J. Mansfield.

At 1:30 this afternoon the final session was opened with the reading of the list of absentees, with the exceptions. Small attendance of elders was commensurate upon, only twelve churches being represented.
