### OUR COUNTRY: First, Last and Forever.

"The gold standard has come because it had to come," says the Philadelphia Press. It is a necessity unless the United States proposes to be a hermit nation.

NEWSPAPER comment on the President's message is generally of the favorable variety. The general merits of the document are acknowledged on every hand, and it admittedly takes rank among the most complete of Presidential messages in the entire history of the country.

THE officials of the state of North Carolina are determined to enforce the law against the issuing of passes by railroads. The Supreme Court of that state the other day decided that the Southern Railway must pay a fine of \$1,000 for violating the law in that respect. Henceforth the North Carolina statesmen will either pay or walk.

CHARLES T. YERKES, the Chicago millionaire, lays down the following financial law: "The man who enters Wall street is an idiot. The man who speculates will lose in the end, and I don't care how much money he has. When he starts that way a guardian should be appointed for him." And still there seems to be any number of men who do not heed the advice.

In view of the many robberies being perpetrated in this section, and the police being unable to capture the daring burglars, the recent decision of the grand jury in Delaware county, this state, is worthy of note. A burglar, while in the act of house-breaking, was shot and killed, and the man who did the shooting was cleared of the charge of murder. The grand jury declared the shooting justifiable.

THAT the trusts are not altogether beyond the reach of law is evidenced by the action of the Supreme Court of the United States, which on Monday handed down a decision against the Iron Pine Combination. The action of the court of last resort will certainly have a most important bearing upon the general subject of trusts and will likely lead Congress to give more than passing attention to this important subject.

In suspending Congressman-elect Roberts from taking his seat the House of Representatives has stirred up the newspaper sense of fair play. The press gallery muttered somewhat ominously, according to the Washington news, over the members who did not vote as they act. It is an old story—this of Washington temptations and law morals. Once in a while some flagrant, unobscured scandal, like Breckinridge's, gives an inkling of the untold mass of evil that seethes underneath the very general respectability of the National Capital.

**THE TRANSVAAL WAR**  
Simultaneous Battles Expected at Natal and Spytfontein.

London, Dec. 8.—General Buller's arrival at Freere is held to indicate that all the preparations for an advance to the relief of Ladysmith are complete and that stirring news will soon be received. The fact that Lord Roberts is announced as resuming his command at almost the same moment is interpreted in some quarters to mean that battles will be fought simultaneously in Natal and at Spytfontein. It appears doubtful, however, whether General Buller's force is yet ready for what will evidently be a heavy encounter.

The Daily Mail publishes a dispatch from Julian Ralph at Modder River, who says: "The Kimberley people are troubled by the necessity of feeding 10,000 Basutos in the diamond fields whom the Boers refuse to allow to depart and who, should they fail to get enough meat, would become discontented and restless. There were 530 Boers killed or wounded in the battle here. That number has already been accounted for, and the enemy's losses were probably much heavier." A succinct message from Colonel Kekelevich, at Kimberley, says the town is provisioned for 40 days, with forage for 30 days, and has a plentiful water supply.

**Liller "Removed for Incompetency."**  
Columbus, O., Dec. 8.—The general order No. 1 of the commander-in-chief of the National Army of Spanish War Veterans, General J. Warren Keifer, was issued yesterday. The only cognizance taken of the recent bolt made by W. C. Liller is the following: "W. C. Liller, who has been acting temporarily as adjutant general, is removed for incompetency." He is directed to turn over all property to General H. H. Axline, who is appointed to succeed him.

### WOMAN ROUTS A BURGLAR.

Now Confined to Bed as a Result of Her Struggle.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—Mrs. L. Schurtzenberger, a national delegate from the Red Cross society to the Philippines, and a personal friend of President McKinley, is lying at the home of Mrs. S. S. Wise, 401 Thirty-third street, under a physician's care, with her face bruised and swollen and her arms and body black and blue, as the result of a struggle with a burglar Wednesday night. Mrs. Schurtzenberger, who recently returned from Manila, was awakened by hearing some one in her room. She jumped up, grappled with the burglar and screamed for help. In the struggle for the possession of Mrs. Schurtzenberger's jewel case she was struck time and time again. The burglar finally plunged through a window and escaped, but without plunder. Mrs. Schurtzenberger will probably be confined to her bed for some time.

**P. A. B. Widener's Philanthropy.**  
Philadelphia, Dec. 8.—Peter A. B. Widener announces, in a briefly worded letter to Mayor Ashbridge, that he has purchased a tract of 36 acres near Logan Station, between North Broad street and Q. York road, upon which every power of the present plan, the industrial home for crippled children, at a cost of \$2,000,000. The tract of land will be covered by about 12 buildings, of which the largest or main structure will be a distinctive edifice fronting on Broad street. This building will be erected on the dormitory plan, the annex structures being used for industrial and educational purposes. The main building will be devoted to the shelter of the inmates.
