FOR PEACH LEAF CURL.

The most common disease of the peach trees this year is the disease of the leaf known as the Peach Leaf Curl. It causes the leaves to become swollen and abnormally red and blotched in color. It has been observed to be much worse upon trees that were partially injured by freezing and upon certain varieties of trees like the "Elberta".
