### Criminal Court.

The August term of criminal court began last week and extended into this week. The last criminal case for this term was the murder trial, which was called yesterday forenoon, and is still on. The criminal list this time was the largest one since Judge Reed was elected. There were quite a number of F. & B. cases which are not given in the following ones—disposed of at this term:

Com. vs. David Haus; selling liquor without license. Verdict, guilty.

Com. vs. George Kougher, Wesley Kougher and Harry Kougher; larceny. Wesley and Harry plead guilty; sentenced to pay \$5.00 fine, costs of prosecution and 30 days in jail.

Com. vs. Jacob Mertzloff; assault with intent to kill. Not a true bill and prosecutor to pay costs.

Com. vs. John Kriss; assault and battery. Settled.

Com. vs. Robert Brent; larceny. Verdict, not guilty.

Com. vs. David Harding; desertion. T. Darr; appointed examiner.

Com. vs. Robert Oelens; selling liquor without license. Plead guilty. Sentenced to pay \$500.00 fine, costs of prosecution and three months in county jail.

Com. vs. Joseph I. Grube; desertion. H. W. Munderoff; appointed examiner.

### Perhaps Fatally Stabbed.

Hyacoth Gracco, an Italian, residing at Anita, was taken to Adrian Hospital yesterday in a Ringgold township huckster wagon, with three stiletto wounds, one of which may prove fatal, having penetrated the liver. He also received a wound just below the heart and another one in the head. The hospital physicians say his chances for recovery are slight.

The victim of the affray tells the following story: He said he had made arrangements with Jennie Ferrari on Saturday to visit her on the following Monday morning. When he went to her house she left him in and closed the door and locked it. She then attacked him with a stiletto, made of a file, and inflicted the wounds already described. While Gracco lay on the floor helpless and bleeding from his wounds, an Italian named Nichol Pork, who was in the house at the time, undertook to finish him with a revolver, but the woman interfered, protesting that she had given him enough.

Gracco says he lay there until 12 o'clock, when the woman's husband came home and let him out, helping to place him on a farm wagon, by which he was taken to the hospital.—Punxsutawney Spirit.
