An official of the Pittsburg & Lake Erie railroad said yesterday that not a month in the past 10 years has passed without some of the offices being hampered somewhat in operation because of a lack of efficient men for this kind of work and just now there is a notable shortage in the passenger department. The Pennsylvania system is also in need of a number of good stenographers. This scarcity of apt and common sense writers of shorthand and operators of the typewriter is not confined to railroads, for a number of leading corporations have expressed the same thing in their office work.—Pittsburg Post.


