WEST REYNOLDSVILLE STREET LIGHTING ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, it is desired that the Reynoldsville Light & Power Company make a new contract with the Borough of West Reynoldsville, for the lighting of the streets, lanes and alleys of said Borough with Street Series Tungsten lamps;

THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same:

Section 1. That the said Borough hire from The Reynoldsville Light & Power Company its successors or assigns, not less than Twelve (12) Street Series Tungsten lights, to be of not less than 100 watts, and to be kept burning each and every night during the period of this contract, to be located at such point or points as the Light Committee of the Town Council may direct, which said lights shall be kept and maintained by the said Reynoldsville Light & Power Company, its successors or assigns for the period of three (3) years from the 1st day of January A. D. 1911, and so long thereafter as may be satisfactory to both parties. Either party, after the period of three (3) years, may terminate this contract by giving ninety (90) days notice in writing to the other party.

In consideration for which the said Borough of West Reynoldsville will pay or cause to be paid to The Reynoldsville Light & Power Company, its successors or assigns, the sum of thirty-two and 50/100 (\$32.50) Dollars per annum, for each and every Street Series Tungsten light so kept and maintained, provided however, that where the renewals for any series Tungsten lamp or lamps shall exceed four for the year, that then the said Borough will pay or cause to be paid to the said Light Company, its successors or assigns, the sum of Thirty-five (\$35.00) Dollars, for each and every Street Series Tungsten light so kept, maintained and renewed more than four times for the year. Said sum to be paid quarterly on the 1st day of January, April, July and October of each and every year during the period this contract shall be in force and effect.

Deductions and allowances shall be made by the said Reynoldsville Light & Power Company, its successors or assigns, for any light or lights that do not burn the required length of time as follows:

For the time the first night any individual lamp does not burn, the Light Company shall deduct the amount it would have received had the lamp been burning for that time, and for the time during the second and subsequent nights when any individual lamp does not burn, the Light Company agrees to deduct the individual outage for the time the lamp did not burn plus an additional outage of twenty-five (25) percent for the time the lamp did not burn by way of penalty.

The Borough Council agrees to cooperate with the Light Company in ascertaining when lights are out and will have its employees notify the Light Company promptly, either personally or by postal cards, of any light they may know of being out, said deductions and allowances to be determined for each quarter, before the light bill is paid.

In case of any accident by fire, the elements or any other unavoidable accident, the Light Company shall have a reasonable time in which to repair its lights or plant, during which time the said Company shall receive no pay for lights not actually furnished, and the general outage shall be determined at the end of each quarter, and a deduction at pro rata the cost of the light, shall be made for the general outage so found, it being understood that there is to be no penalty for general outage.

Section 2. The Borough of West Reynoldsville will annually hereafter, levy and collect from its inhabitants a tax sufficient for the purpose of paying for said Street Series Tungsten lights as now provided by law.

Section 3. Should the said Reynoldsville Light & Power Company, its successors or assigns, fail to accept this ordinance and be bound by the terms and conditions thereof, within thirty days from the date hereof, then this ordinance shall become void and the Borough of West Reynoldsville shall be released from all liability thereunder.

Section 4. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with this ordinance is hereby repealed, so far as the same affects this ordinance.

Ordained and enacted into a law in Council this 5th day of December A. D. 1910.

PUNXSUTAWNEY COUNCIL REPUDIATES GAS AGREEMENT

Bitter Controversy Over Attorney Gillespie's Compromise With Phillips Co.

The controversy between the Phillips Gas Company and the Council of Punxsutawney concerning the right of the gas company to charge over twenty cents per thousand feet for gas furnished to residents and industries of Punxsutawney, reached a climax last week when the council by a vote of seven to three refused to ratify the compromise agreement which had been prepared by the borough solicitor, W. M. Gillespie.

President Fairman in a lengthy talk strongly urged the council not to ratify the agreement entered into, stating that he believed that the borough was in the right and that although the borough might suffer industrially he was representing the poor of the town as well as the moneyed men and proposed first to take care of the needy, those who were unable to stand the raise above twenty cents per thousand cubic feet.

NOTICE OF Application for License

Order of the Court of Quarter Sessions fixing the time at which applications for liquor licenses may be heard, etc.

And now, October 30, 1898, it is ordained as follows:

1. That the third Monday of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and each and every year thereafter at nine o'clock in the forenoon of each day being the second Monday of the January term in each year, be and the same is hereby fixed as the time at which applications for license to sell spirituous, vinous, malt or brewed liquors shall be heard, at which time all persons applying or making objections to applications for said licenses may be heard by evidence, petition, remonstrance or counsel.

2. That licenses then granted shall take effect and be in force one year from the sixteenth day of February next following the granting of the same.

3. Applications for places not heretofore licensed must be required to establish (1) the fitness of the applicant and (2) the necessity for such licensed place, and in contested cases not more than three witnesses on a side will be heard on the question of the general character of the applicant and the necessity of the place for which a license is desired.

4. Supplemental petitions and remonstrances in writing; also specific objections to the petition or bond of the applicant as well as specific charges made against him shall be reduced to writing and filed in the case at least five days before the time fixed for hearing said application, otherwise they will not be heard, and no evidence will be heard in support of them, by the Court. This rule shall not apply to disqualifying causes arising within the five days preceding the hearing.

5. No spirituous, vinous, malt or brewed liquors, or any admixtures thereof, shall be furnished or sold by any licensee vending between the hours of 10:30 o'clock, p. m., and 5:30 o'clock a. m., of each day on which said liquors otherwise may be legally sold.

All orders and rules, or parts thereof, now in force, which may be inconsistent with the foregoing order or rules, are hereby rescinded.
