MEMORIAL EXERCISES

Freeland Will Pay Tribute to Nation's Chief.

Borough Council and Republican League Take Action—Public Meeting to Be Held Tonight.

Freeland people, in common with the nation at large, mourn the untimely death of President McKinley and keenly feel the loss which the country has sustained. While the end was not wholly unexpected, the news that he had passed away cast a gloom over the town on Saturday, and after the first shock had been overcome there was a feeling among all classes of people that Freeland should act in paying to the dead president the homage and respect to which his position entitled him.

The authorities of the borough, believing it their duty to lead in a movement designed to give public expression to the grief occasioned by the assassination of the country's executive, have promptly acted, and it is expected that they will receive the cordial and united support of all people of town in conducting such exercises as may be agreed upon.

At a special meeting of the borough council on Saturday evening, called to take action upon the death of President McKinley, it was decided to have memorial exercises, consisting of a procession and addresses on Thursday, the day chosen for the interment of the late president at Canton, Ohio. A committee to make such arrangements as may be necessary was appointed.

A committee was also chosen to prepare resolutions on the death of the president. The resolution committee was instructed to insert a request to all business people and employers of labor to close their establishments and workshops on Thursday.

Chief Burgess Boyle was authorized to take charge of the memorial exercises, and, with the assistance of the committee of arrangements, to prepare a suitable program for the day.

At the same time the members of the Republican League of Freeland were in session in the P. O. S. of A. building. The meeting was called to take action on the president's death. It was decided to appoint a committee to work in conjunction with any other committees which may be appointed to arrange memorial exercises.

As a result, a public meeting will be held at the Municipal building this evening. All the people of town are requested to be present to assist in outlining an appropriate program for Thursday.

The borough council will meet in special session tomorrow evening to confirm any action taken by their committees.

THE TOWN IN MOURNING.

The silent evidences of the sorrow which is felt in town are noticeable on every hand. Freeland people promptly responded on Saturday morning to the desire that some outward sign be shown of the grief they felt, and the building

MISCELLANEOUS ADVERTISEMENTS.

AN ORDINANCE.—An ordinance creating a Board of Health.
Be it ordained and enacted by the burgess and town council of the borough of Freeland in council met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:
Section 1. That a Board of Health in and for the borough of Freeland be and the same is hereby created to have, exercise and discharge the powers and duties given under Article XI of the act of assembly entitled "an act providing for the incorporation and government of cities of the third class," approved May 25, 1898, and also an act of assembly entitled "an act to enable borough councils to establish boards of health," approved May 11, 1893, and all such other acts of assembly of the commonwealth as relate to the creation and management of boards of health in boroughs.
Section 2. For the purpose of making appointments to membership of the said board, the borough shall be divided into districts in such manner as the Board of Health, with the approval of council, shall from time to time determine.
Section 3. The secretary and health officer shall severally give bond in the sum of One Hundred Dollars each, conditioned as required by law.
Section 4. The secretary shall keep a registry of all fees received by the board, or any officer thereof, in the administration of the duties of their appointments, as also all penalties which shall be recovered for the violation of any regulation of the board; and the same shall be paid over monthly to the borough treasurer. He shall also render a written monthly report of the workings of the board to the borough council.
Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Whereas, The citizens of Freeland through their municipal authorities desire to express their profound sorrow at the death of him whom the nation mourns; therefore, be it

Resolved, As the sense of this body that the country has lost the services of an honest, respected and capable executive, and in common with the people of the United States we deeply mourn the loss.

Resolved, That we, the members of Freeland Borough Council, extend our warmest sympathy, in behalf of the people of Freeland, to his beloved wife and relatives in this hour of personal bereavement and national sorrow.

Resolved, That as a mark of respect we direct that the borough buildings be draped in mourning for thirty days; that the day of the funeral be observed as one of prayer and mourning; that all business places be closed, and that so far as possible there be a complete cessation of labor throughout the town.
