FREELAND TO PAY TRIBUTE

Memorial Exercises to Dead President Tomorrow.

Arrangements for Proce- sion and Exercises Now Complete—A Large and Fitting Turnout Expected.

The people of Freeland have acted promptly in the matter of arrangements to have fitting memorial exercises in commemoration of the untimely death of the nation's chief executive, William McKinley. Since Saturday evening meetings of every description looking to the proper observance of the day have been held.

ROUND THE REGION.

Lightning played a queer prank on a force of Philadelphia and Reading Railroad repairmen at Mahanoy Plane, during a severe storm Monday afternoon. There were nearly thirty men in the crowd, and when the storm broke they hurried under a big water tank, which stands beside the track. Lightning struck it near the base, flooding 60,000 gallons of water down on top of the crouching men, scared speechless. The men were washed out into the pen, but aside from an involuntary bath, they escaped injury.

Two girls were seriously injured yesterday by a runaway construction car in East Mauch Chunk on the electric railway. The car left the track, and after traveling a distance of 100 yards turned completely over, landing in the yard of Oliver Martz with a terrific crash.

Carrie Martz and Lillian Ryan, who were in the yard, were struck by the runaway car. Mrs. Martz was also slightly hurt. The former is dying and the latter has been unconscious for several hours.

The Democratic county convention met yesterday in the courthouse at Mauch Chunk and in thirty minutes nominated Frank P. Sharkey, for district attorney; Franz Mackel, for surveyor, and Dr. Jacob H. Behler, for coroner.

A Day With the Court.

Before Judge Lynch Joseph Yushawicz, who was convicted last week on a charge of manslaughter growing out of the killing of Martin Cawley in the defendant's saloon at Duryea on the night of May 26 last, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and the costs and to an imprisonment of two years at labor in the county jail.

M. H. McAniff, the defendant's attorney, made a motion for a new trial on the ground that the verdict was against the evidence and the law and not in accord with the charge of the court. In denying the motion Judge Lynch said the verdict of the jury was not against the charge of the court.

The jury, he said, was composed of intelligent men and they had tried the case fairly. One of the reasons, he said, for so much crime in this county was the carrying and the reckless use of deadly weapons. The court could see no reason why a man in this county should have a loaded revolver, knife or deadly weapon on or about his person.

The defendant, he said, admitted that he kept a loaded revolver behind the bar within easy reach. Yushawicz had no right to take the life of the deceased.

An odd shoe was the means of convicting James Courtright, at Wilkesbarre, and sending him to jail for two years. He was accused of receiving stolen goods, the case being based on a shoe found in his house, the mate of which was in a box at the Lehigh Valley depot, which thieves had broken into.

Joseph Vite, of town, pleaded guilty to killing Ralph Salvadore, at Hazleton on June 29 last, in court yesterday. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and undergo imprisonment for twelve years in Eastern penitentiary.

A Suit for Damages.

A suit in trespass for damages in the sum of \$5,000 was entered on Saturday by Joseph Long against the Hazleton and Wilkesbarre Railroad Company, which is now laying the tracks for a new trolley line to connect Wilkesbarre and Hazleton. The plaintiff is the owner of two tracts of timber land in Sugarloaf township and he states that the defendant company has damaged his property to the amount of damages claimed by chopping down the trees along the proposed line of the railway where it crosses his premises. J. M. Garman is the plaintiff's attorney.
