### NO AMERICAN SHIPS.

OUR MERCHANTS DRIVEN FROM THE OCEAN BY REPUBLICAN LEGISLATION, AND OUR IMMENSE CARRYING TRADE GIVEN TO FOREIGN BOTTOMS—LET CANDID MEN READ AND PONDER.  
From the St. Louis Republican.

It is stated that Mr. Vanderbilt, in establishing a line of steamships between New York and European ports to run in connection with his railroad system, sought for American vessels for the service; but they were not to be had. There are very few first-class iron steamers of American build in existence; they are so costly, through the tariff on iron, lumber and nearly all other materials entering into them, that we have nearly ceased to build them. Mr. Vanderbilt would have ordered the ships he needed built abroad, or he would have bought them already built, and put them to work; but that was not allowed him; our navigation laws stand in the way. These laws deny the privilege of home registry to vessels built abroad. There was nothing to be done, therefore, but employ foreign ships, built and owned abroad, to perform the service—and this was resorted to at last. Senator Blaine and other New England Republican statesmen are entirely satisfied with the result. They hold that it is better we should have no ships at all, than that we have no business carrying our own immense exports to Europe and claiming the freight money thereon, unless we can carry them in vessels built as well as owned at home.

We have tried this New England policy for eighteen years—ever since the Republican party came into power, and from the beginning to this time we have seen our shipping, which, under Democratic rule, covered every sea, and was the glory of the country, absolute free trade in ships, and in everything that enters into the composition of ships. Under the Blaine-Roach system, a steamer built in England costs thirty per cent less than one of the same class and style built in America. If protection were out of the way, how long would it be before "the boot was on the other leg?" If American cotton goods, cutlery, agricultural machinery, and locomotives are successfully competing with the English articles in the principal foreign markets, why may not American ships do the same? When Missouri alone has more iron than all England when our mechanics are unrivalled for skill and ingenuity, and when we lead the world in the variety and perfection of our labor saving appliances—can we not, with a fair chance, undersell England in ships? Give us, then, the fair chance, and meanwhile allow our shipping merchants to buy vessels where they can be bought cheapest. We may protect and subsidize for the next century without accomplishing any good result. Ten years of free-trade would not only lift our ocean commerce to larger dimensions than it has ever known, but make the United States the ship-yard of both hemispheres.

ton guns made by Sir William Armstrong in England, for their iron-clads, which throw a projectile weighing 2500 pounds 9 miles. Such a weapon could sink any ship in our navy and demolish any of our forts on the sea board, that at a long range where it would be impossible for our guns to inflict the slightest injury in reply. In England the plant necessary to make a 160 ton gun has been prepared. In view of these facts it is clear that in event of war our commerce would be rapidly destroyed, our ports blockaded, and our great cities on the sea coast be placed under contribution. There are over \$2,000,000,000 worth of property on our coasts says Gen. Gillmore, that would be in easy range of hostile fleets. The neglect of Congress to provide the greatly needed armament cannot be considered less than criminal, for we are liable at any time to be suddenly plunged into a war with some foreign nation possessing powerful ordnance, from which we could not fail to retreat with losses of national honor and reputation and tremendous pecuniary damage, simply because our sea-coast and naval vessels were unprovided with suitable heavy guns. It should be remembered that the work of procuring these guns cannot be left until there is immediate danger of hostilities, as to make a single gun, such as a twelve inch rifle is a work requiring months, and also extensive plant and skilled labor which cannot be procured readily. Another fact well known to frontiersmen is that the Indians have better rifles than our soldiers have to fight with because red tape prevents our soldiers from being provided with the latest improvements used by private manufacturers.

Among the many plans proposed by the majority in congress for overcoming the objections of the executive and accomplishing as much towards their own purpose as possible, the more plausible one is that for passing a bill for the judicial expenses with only the jury test oath repeal attached, and the appropriation for U. S. marshals omitted, but to be embodied in a separate bill. The first of course the president will sign as he is in favor of the repeal of the test oath. The second will contain a prohibition of payment for U. S. deputy marshals for election purposes and the Democrats, or a large majority of them declare that having provided for the courts, and every branch of the service, if the president vetoes this bill, that the S. marshal appropriation may fail. This is probably the "last ditch," and I believe the Democrats will stick to it. I believe also that the president will not call congress together again merely because of the failure to appropriate money for the marshals. Some embarrassment might ensue in certain cases, but it could not be great until congress meets again.
