KALLOCH'S PLEA.
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13.—I. M. Kalloch, charged with killing Charles De Young, to-day before the superior court pleaded "Once in jeopardy." This plea was entered on the ground that an information charging defendant with the murder was set aside in May last.

TOO HANDY WITH HIS CLUB.
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 13.—Last week Officer Abe Findling, while making an arrest in a house of ill-fame, used his mace with startling effect upon James Prator, colored, whom he claimed resisted arrest. To-night the police board dismissed Findling and appointed H. Stewart to the vacancy. The discharged officer has been connected with the force for many years.

THE ENGLISH SWINDLER TOPSON.
PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 13.—Jos. Topson, secretary of the Metropolitan Railway company's Provident Savings bank of London, who was arrested on Saturday night in this city for forgery and embezzlement of £10,000 belonging to depositors of that institution, was arraigned before a U. S. commissioner in extradition proceedings to-day. In absence of Judge Butler, who is required to appoint a special commissioner in the case, the hearing was postponed until to-morrow, the prisoner being committed without bail. Topson admitted his identity. The English police officers say that the feeling is very strong against him by the poor depositors in London.

HOMICIDE AT FARMINGTON, MO.
DE LASSUS, Mo., Sept. 13.—A fatal shooting scrape took place in front of the courthouse at Farmington to-day, in which McMullin, sheriff, and Henry Horn, a noted desperado, were the participants. There appears to have been an old feud between them, arising out of the frequent arrests of Horn for violations of the law, the last one taking place yesterday, he being arrested for disturbing the peace at the fair grounds. It is said that Horn came to town this morning with the avowed intention of killing the sheriff, for he expressed as much to several parties. He also tried to shoot another man at the fair grounds to-day and was only prevented from doing so by the interference of friends. The facts as gleaned by your reporter are as follows: McMullin and Horn were standing on the sidewalk on Main street. Horn was a little under the influence of liquor and McMullin was trying to get him to desist in the use of obscene and abusive language. Horn then started across the street, saying something and pulling his pistol at the same time. McMullin followed about five steps and Horn had crossed about two-thirds of the street, when he suddenly turned, taking deliberate aim at McMullin, who immediately brought his pistol in position. Horn then fired, striking McMullin near the nipple on the right side, and McMullin returned the blow, hitting Horn's little finger, who fired another shot, striking McMullin in the abdomen. McMullin fired again, striking Horn just below the nipple but fortunately for him his suspender buckle kept the ball from penetrating his body. Had it met no obstacle Horn would have been no more. Horn fired again, missing McMullin entirely. McMullin then shot him through the thigh. Horn fell and raised his pistol to shoot again, but seeing his adversary on his feet ready to give another shot, he threw up his pistol saying: "I give up; I am dying," whereupon McMullin stood over him, saying: "You have also done the work for me." McMullin then walked off and would have fallen had not his friends assisted him to his home. McMullin will die. The sympathy of the community is with our sheriff who was killed in the discharge of his duty. He is about 60 years of age and leaves an interesting family to mourn his loss. Horn is in jail.

THE FEATURES OF THE BIG SHOW.

The Chicago Times says of Barnum's great show:
At 1 o'clock the matinee patrons of the big show began to crowd the museum and menagerie, and all find entertainment for an hour or so in studies of the former's curiosities and the latter's collection of rare beasts and birds, both offering a mass of novelties beyond the usual.

The circus entertainment and a host of agile acrobats, daring gymnasts, expert jugglers and athletic leapers are pleasing to all lovers of manly strength and skill in varied acts, while Madame Doekrill and Sebastian are gaining storms of applause by their dashing equestrian acts, while Miss Lake is showing the ladies the grace possible in the side-saddle, and Neygaard and his wife ride four horses in showing style.

The stallions and the steers delight city and country folk alike with their wonderful trick-training, and a marked feature of the show.

Zazel, the crowning sensation of the show, discarded her Japanese umbrella (used as a balance) at Springfield, last evening. She exhibits wonderful nerve in her wire walking, which only precedes her startling dive and somersault from the top of the tent, and her astonishing final flight from a cannon's mouth, the crowning act of the highly enjoyable entertainment.

That there is no humbug about even the minor features of the show is vouched for on the authority of the Springfield Republican, as follows:

"Barnum is once more vindicated. There was some scepticism about town as to whether his group of native Zulus would prove to be foreign or home savages, especially since the excitement at Hartford a few weeks ago when Mr. Wilder interviewed an alleged Zulu, who was making a show of himself, in the Zulu tongue, and found that he was ignorant of the language as of Greek. Considerable interest was awakened in Barnum's heathen when it became known to a limited circle in this city that the Groat family, who now reside here but were long engaged in missionary work in Africa, where the younger members were born, would try the Hartford experiment over again. When the Zulus were addressed in the circus tents yesterday in their native tongue, they not only responded readily but were not a little pleased to find some one to talk with them for the second time since coming to this country. The conversation became for the crowd an interesting side-show which was not down on the bills."
