ORDINANCE NUMBER FOUR

An Ordinance Providing for Licenses.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Globe:

SECTION I.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons or body corporate to engage in or carry on within the corporate limits of the City of Globe, any business, profession or occupation for which a license is required, without first taking out or procuring the license required for such business, profession or occupation.

SECTION II.

No license granted or issued under any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be in any manner assignable or transferable, or authorize any person other than is therein mentioned or named to do business, or authorize any other business than is therein mentioned or named to be done or transacted, at any place other than is therein mentioned or named, without permission from the Common Council endorsed thereon.

Whenever the Common Council shall grant such privilege, it shall immediately report the same to the City Marshal.

Every such license shall specify by name the person, firm or corporation to whom or which it shall be issued, and shall designate the particular place at which the business shall be carried on.

SECTION III.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than three hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the City or County Jail for a period of not more than three months, or by both.

SECTION IV.

Upon the trial of any criminal action brought under or arising from any provision of this Ordinance, the defendant shall be deemed not to have procured the municipal license, for the current time, unless he or she either produces the same or proves having paid for the same to the proper officer.

SECTION V.

In any action brought under or arising out of any provision of this Ordinance, the fact that the party thereto represented himself or herself as engaged in any business or calling for the transaction of which a license is by this Ordinance required, or that such party exhibited a sign indicating such business or calling, shall be prima facie evidence of the liability of such party to pay for a license.

SECTION VI.

If any person shall furnish such evidence as shall satisfy the Common Council that he or she, by reason of misfortune or physical infirmity, merits exemption from the provision of any section or clause of this Ordinance, a free gratuitous license may be issued to such party upon the recommendation of said Common Council, said licenses to be countersigned by a majority of said Common Council.

SECTION VII.

All licenses for owners, keepers or drivers of vehicles, hackney carriages or herdic coaches shall date from the first day of January or July of each year and shall be issued for six months from either of the aforesaid dates.

Licenses on dogs shall expire on the 31st day of December in each year, and shall be issued for one year from January 1st of each year.

All licenses of street railroad passenger cars, insurance companies or insurance agents, runners and solicitors, peddlers of produce, fish, fruit, game, vegetables and merchandise from baskets or wagons, shall date from the first day of January, April, July or October of each year, and shall be issued for the term of three months, provided on an application being made for the first time during the quarter, the license shall be pro rated and issued to the end of the quarter.

All licenses for theaters, concert halls, places of amusement, entertainments or exhibitions, and all other licenses not enumerated above may be issued for the period of one year, for three months, for one month, or for one day.

SECTION VIII.

All licenses shall be paid for in advance in lawful money of the United States.

No receipts for licenses shall be issued by the City Marshal on any other blanks than those received from the City Clerk.

No greater or less amount of money shall be charged or received for licenses so issued than is charged to said City Marshal by the City Clerk and printed on said license receipts.

No license receipt shall be sold or issued by the City Marshal for any period of time exceeding the time printed on the license receipt, and for which time the same was issued and charged to the City Marshal by the City Clerk.

No person required to be licensed shall receive from the City Marshal or his deputies any license receipts for a longer period than the time printed on the said license blank, or pay for any license receipt any greater or less amount of money than the amount printed on said license receipt.

No person required to be licensed shall pay any sum of money to the City Marshal or his deputies for a license, without demanding and receiving therefor a license receipt on which is printed the time for which said license is issued, and the amount paid therefor.

SECTION IX.

Every person having a license under the provisions of this Ordinance shall exhibit the same at all times while in force in some conspicuous part of his or her place of business, and shall produce same when applying for a renewal, or when requested to do so by any officer of the license or police department.

Every peddler, while engaged in peddling, shall carry his or her license and exhibit the same if required by any municipal officer.

SECTION X.

All persons who shall sell, dispose of or deal in wines, distilled or malt liquors in quantities of two gallons and upward shall be deemed to be wholesale liquor dealers and shall pay a quarterly

license of \$90.00. All persons who sell, dispose of, or deal in wines, distilled or malt liquors in quantities less than two gallons and not less than two pints which shall not be consumed on the premises, shall pay a quarterly license of \$45.00. All persons who shall sell, dispose of or deal in wines, distilled or malt liquors in quantities of less than one gallon for consumption upon the premises shall be deemed to be retail liquor dealers and shall pay a quarterly license of \$90.00, provided that any person who shall pay a quarterly license of \$90.00 as a retail liquor dealer may sell, dispose of or deal in wines, distilled or malt liquors in quantities of not less than one pint nor more than two gallons, which shall not be consumed upon the premises, without the payment of the quarterly license of \$45.00 as herein provided.

SECTION XI.

Every grocer, druggist, jeweler, butcher, dry goods merchant, shoe merchant, milliner, hardware merchant, dealer in curios, lumber merchant, dealer in coal and wood, dealer in second hand goods, fruit, nuts and confectionery, baker and dealer in soda water or soft drinks, shall pay a quarterly license tax to be computed as follows:

Every proprietor, owner or manager of any of the aforesaid businesses or occupations, shall make a written statement under oath to the marshal at the beginning of each quarter, certifying to the amount of business transacted by him, averaged for the preceding quarter, and upon such statement shall pay a quarterly license upon the following basis:

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to less than \$5,000 shall pay a quarterly license of \$10.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$5,000 and less than \$10,000, shall pay a quarterly license of \$15.00.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$10,000 and less than \$15,000, shall pay a quarterly license of \$20.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$15,000 and less than \$20,000 shall pay a quarterly license of \$25.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$20,000 and less than \$25,000 shall pay a quarterly license of \$30.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$25,000 and less than \$30,000 shall pay a quarterly license of \$40.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$30,000 and less than \$50,000, shall pay a quarterly license of \$45.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$50,000 and less than \$75,000, shall pay a quarterly license of \$50.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$75,000 and less than \$100,000 shall pay a quarterly license of \$55.

Those whose aggregate quarterly sales amount to more than \$100,000 shall pay a quarterly license of \$75.

SECTION XII.

The rates of license not heretofore specified shall be according to the following schedule:

1. For each place where bowling or ten pin alleys are maintained, thirty (\$30.00) dollars per quarter.

2. For each gambling table or apparatus of any kind, such as monte, fero, pass fero, roulette, roulette, twenty-two, keno, dice, red and black, languette, tan, studhorse poker, craps, policy, lottery, or any other banking or percentage game, or any game played for money, check or credit or any other representative of value of whatever name, forty-five (\$45.00) dollars per quarter, provided that no license shall be issued for any game whatever in any place frequented by minors.

3. For each street show and carnival, twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day. For each circus, one hundred (\$100.00) per day. For each merry-go-round, twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day. For each theater, two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) per day or fifteen (\$15.00) dollars per quarter.

4. For commission merchants ten (\$10.00) dollars per quarter.

5. For each hotel or inn thirty (\$30.00) dollars per quarter.

6. For each lodging house for transient guests, fifteen (\$15.00) dollars per quarter.

7. For each Stock Broker, forty-five (\$45.00) dollars per quarter. For each Money Broker, fifteen (\$15.00) dollars per quarter; for each Pawn Broker, forty-five (\$45.00) dollars per quarter.

8. For each insurance agent, forty-five (\$45.00) dollars per quarter.

9. For each auctioneer, ten (\$10.00) dollars per quarter.

10. For each restaurant, fifteen (\$15.00) dollars per quarter; provided that this shall not apply to private boarding houses.

11. For each hackman, ten (\$10.00) dollars per quarter. For each drayman, expressman or person hauling goods for hire, fifteen (\$15.00) dollars per quarter.

12. For each steam laundry twenty (\$20.00) dollars per quarter. For each Chinese laundry, ten (\$10.00) dollars per quarter.

13. For each fortune teller, medium, palmist, street faker or person engaged in a similar business or occupation, twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per quarter.

14. For each undertaking establishment, thirty (\$30.00) dollars per quarter.

15. For each photographer engaged in a photograph business, five (\$5.00) dollars per quarter.

16. For each shooting gallery, fifteen (\$15.00) dollars per quarter.

17. For each telegraph company, thirty (\$30.00) dollars per quarter.

18. For each telephone company thirty (\$30.00) dollars per quarter.

19. For each barber shop, three (\$3.00) dollars per quarter for each chair.

20. For each livery stable, dealing in hay and grain, thirty (\$30.00) dollars per quarter; all others, twenty (\$20.00) dollars per quarter.

21. For each tailoring establishment, five (\$5.00) dollars per quarter.

on three days' notice being given to the holder thereof; said holder shall have the right to appear before the Council at the time when the revocation of his license is to be passed upon and to make any showing before the Council that he may desire regarding the same.

SECTION XIV.

This Ordinance shall go into effect upon the first day of February, 1907, and until April 1st, 1907, the person or persons or firms or proprietors of the businesses or occupations for which a license is required by the foregoing provisions, shall secure a license from the said date to April 1st, 1907, and pay the City Marshal therefor, for such period, such proportional sum as the length of such period is to the regular period for which each respective license shall be issued, and thereafter such licenses shall be issued as hereinbefore provided.
