MAYOR McCLELLAN LOSES IN APPEAL

Court Will not Allow Destruction of Ballots Cast in City Election

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, January 29.—Permission to appeal from the decision of the appellate department of the supreme court preventing the destruction of the ballots cast in the last city election was denied to Mayor McClellan by the appellate division today.

The appellate division previously affirmed the decision of the lower court refusing to allow the ballots to be destroyed. The mayor had asked permission to take the case to the court of appeals, but today's decision prevents this.

SEVENTY-TWO BODIES STILL UNDERGROUND

By Associated Press. FRANKFORD ON THE MAIN, January 29.—A dispatch to the Zeitung from Saarbrueck says that there are still seventy-two bodies underground. Of the bodies taken out only twenty-four were recognized. The others were so badly burned that identification has been impossible. One woman became demented when confronted by her husband, she having believed him dead. The cause of the explosion is still a mystery.

WILL WRESTLE FOR WORLD'S CHAMPIONSHIP

KANSAS CITY, January 29.—Hackenschmitz's manager has accepted the offer of the Missouri Athletic club for a match with Frank Gotch in Kansas City in May next for a purse of \$10,000 and the world's wrestling championship, stipulating that the club post \$5,000 in England and that there shall be a side bet of not less than \$1,000 to be posted with Robert Edgren of New York, who is to appoint a referee.

RUSSIANS TO BUY AMERICAN WHEAT

PETERSBURG, January 29.—On account of the failure of the local wheat crop, Russia this year will be a purchaser of American wheat and the first shipment will arrive soon at Riga from London on its way to Rybinsk. The price in the Russian market will probably be \$1.15 a bushel, which is 7 cents under the local price. Other cargoes have been ordered for delivery at St. Petersburg as soon as navigation opens.

MILLIONS OF NEW SANTA FE STOCK

STANDARD CHALLENGES RIGHTS OF THE COURT

COPPER METAL MARKET

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, January 29.—Copper was lower in the English market, spot closing at £106 5s and futures at £107 12s 6d. Locally the market was quiet but firm, with Lake quoted at 24.75 to 25.25; Electrolytic at 25.62 1/2 to 25.87 1/2; Casting at 24.25 to 24.75. Lead was unchanged at 6.00 to 6.25 in the local market and at £19 15s in London. Spelter was 5s lower at £26 15s in London, but remained steady at 6.00 to 6.15 in the local market. Iron was unchanged. Bar silver, 67 1/2; Mexican dollars, 52 1/2.

MINE TRAGEDY AT CASA GRANDE

Young Miner Drops Down Fifty-five Foot Shaft and Body Blown to Pieces by a Shot from Which He Was Trying to Get Away.

Chris Loss, a young man 19 years of age and a son of Peter Loss of Casa Grande, was killed in what is known as the House mine belonging to the Compton Copper company, thirty miles south of Casa Grande, Wednesday night of last week at about 11 o'clock, says the Florence Blade. The deceased young man had been employed at the mine for some time, but his work had been on top of the ground at the mouth of the shaft until the night of the accident, when he had exchanged places with a Mexican employed in the shaft.

This shaft was fifty-five feet in depth and was being sunk with the assistance of a gasoline hoist which a young Mexican was running. When the two men in the shaft gave the firing signal they told the Mexican at the top of the shaft to ask the Mexican at the engine if he understood the signal, and the reply was in the affirmative. Jack McKinnon, who was the other miner in the shaft, then spit the fuses and both men stepped into the bucket and the hoisting signal was given. The bucket was a small one and the two miners had but one foot each in it. When they reached the top, the engineer stopped about two seconds and then shot the bucket upward. McKinnon, by jumping, got out all right, but Loss depended for a second or two longer upon the engineer stopping the engine again in response to his yells, and then realizing the danger of being run up into the sheaves and knowing that his hold on the rope would be broken and he would be dashed to the earth or down the shaft, he let go his hold on the rope and attempted to jump, but the bucket swung out from under him and he fell head first down the shaft. McKinnon tried to grab him as he went down, but having scarcely regained his own balance after leaping out of the bucket, he did not reach far enough to fasten onto the clothing of Loss, but did catch his cap. Had he caught hold of Loss he would undoubtedly have gone down the shaft also, but when he missed his hold he listened long enough to hear the body strike the bottom of the shaft with a dull thud and to ascertain if there was any sound of life from the man below, and hearing none, he ordered the engineer to lower the bucket, but the latter had run the bucket up into the sheaves with such force that it was stuck there and before it could be loosened so much time had elapsed that it would have been sheer madness to have attempted the rescue of the body—which was McKinnon's idea—and the other man at the shaft convinced him of this. McKinnon then ordered that the bucket be lowered to the bottom of the shaft so that in case Loss was able to get in he could do so, but when the bucket had touched the bottom of the shaft he held the rope so as to feel if there was any movement below, but there was not and in but a few seconds the charges went off, blowing the remains of the man in the shaft in two and mutilating them so badly they had to be gathered up in a sack.

Last Edison Victim

By Associated Press. BAKERSFIELD, Cal., January 29.—The remains of the last Edison miner killed in the disaster December 7 was taken from the ill-fated shaft last night. The body was that of C. D. Robles, a Mexican whose antecedents are unknown. The inquest on the five bodies will be held within a day or two.

FOURTEEN CLAIMS AT SUPERIOR SOLD

Important Deal Consummated by Which Los Angeles Parties Take Over Property Adjacent to Silver Queen and Lake Superior & Arizona.

Fourteen claims adjoining the famous Silver King mine in Pinal county, Arizona and four claims adjoining the Silver Queen and the Superior & Arizona properties have been bought under one ownership this week and are to be actively developed, says the Los Angeles Mining Review of the 17th.

Mr. J. H. McCabe of Phoenix, Ariz., and Messrs. L. A. Snider, Otto Weiss and A. B. Downe of Los Angeles have entered into an agreement whereby title of the eighteen claims will pass to a company to be formed with a capitalization of \$3,000,000, shares \$10 par. It is the intention of the new owners to clean out and re timber an old shaft, 150 feet deep, on the extension of the old Silver Queen vein. This shaft was sunk years ago in ore, much of which was high grade and was shipped, though transportation by wagon for ninety miles was then necessary. The dumps contain much copper ore, now of an attractive grade, which was valuable under conditions existing when the claims were worked.

MINER MISTAKEN FOR WILDCAT WILL RECOVER

John Gilmore, the miner who was shot Tuesday evening near Gibson's by Bob Burch, who mistook Gilmore for a bobcat, was brought in to Globe yesterday afternoon and is under the care of Dr. J. L. Wales. The bullet struck Gilmore in the neck, ranging downward and coming out in the back below the shoulders. He is expected to recover. Gilmore tells the same story as Burch regarding the shooting and in a statement to Judge Thomas last evening exonerated Burch from all blame.

Will Wed Today

Clarence Jacobs, the well known young business man of this city, will be united in marriage this evening in San Francisco to Miss Vanderhoff. Mr. and Mrs. Jacobs are expected in Globe in about ten days.
