

Wear a Kilt and Be Warm

An enthusiastic Scot has written to the press trying to convert Englishmen to wearing kilts, especially in cold weather. He assures them that anybody who has once worn the kilt will never forget the comfort and warmth it insures.

His opinion is endorsed by a West End physician, who, among other arguments, claims that petticoats are much warmer than trousers. He repudiates the idea that the legs of those wearing kilts must be cold, and says that the mere baring of the knees is harmless. He instances football players leaving the knees uncovered for the purpose of bracing the sinews. He points out that worsted stockings, which are a concomitant of kilts, are warmer than the present leg gear.

The editor of the Tailor and Cutter says that the fashionable streets of the West End would certainly gain in picturesque by the adoption of the kilt. Among other advantages it would necessarily kill the obnoxious high hat and abolish baggy kneed trousers. He informs the uninitiated that nine yards of cloth are required for a kilt, owing to the numerous pleats. Thus it is more costly than an ordinary suit, but will wear far longer and will never lose its shape.—London cable to the New York Sun.

That we, J. B. Newman, S. L. Gibson, F. L. Toombs and J. A. Bordeaux, all of Globe, Gila County, Arizona, being desirous of incorporating ourselves under the laws of the Territory of Arizona for the purpose of engaging in the business hereinafter specified, do make, acknowledge and subscribe to the following Articles of Incorporation and declare:

I. That the names of the incorporators are above set forth; that the name of the corporation is THE ARIZONA SECURITY AND DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION, and the principal place of transacting its business shall be at Globe, Gila County, Territory of Arizona.

II. The general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by this corporation shall be as follows: To acquire by purchase or otherwise mines and mineral lands and claims and all appurtenances thereto for the operation of same; to hold and develop, exploit and to otherwise use the same; to sell, promote and otherwise dispose of the same as can any natural person; to buy, sell and deal in all the stocks, bonds, mortgages, debentures and other securities, or evidences of indebtedness whatever of other corporations or individuals and to do a general brokerage business and to act as agent as is permitted of any individual under the general statutes of the Territory of Arizona.

III. The amount of capital stock authorized by this corporation shall be Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) divided into fifty thousand (50,000) shares of the par value of One Dollar (\$1.00) each, which said stock shall be issued from time to time, as the Board of Directors may provide, and the whole of said stock may be paid for in money, property, or services, and upon such terms as shall be acceptable to the Board of Directors; that such stock shall be fully paid for, when issued, and be non-assessable.

IV. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the date of the filing of these Articles of Incorporation in the office of the County Recorder of Gila County, Arizona, a certified copy filed with the Territorial Auditor, and the termination shall be twenty-five (25) years thereafter.

V. The above named incorporators shall constitute the Board of Directors for the ensuing year, which said Board shall as soon as practicable after the filing of these Articles, organize and adopt by-laws and rules and regulations suitable for the management of this corporation and its affairs.

VI. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation is at any time to be subject shall be the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) and the private property of each stockholder of this corporation shall be exempt from all corporation debts whatsoever.

AMENDMENTS TO THE ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE GLOBE-WHEATFIELDS MINING COMPANY

ORDINANCE NUMBER TWELVE

An Ordinance Regulating the Collection of Street Tax.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Globe:

SECTION I.

An annual street tax of Two Dollars is hereby levied on each and every male inhabitant over twenty-one years of age and under fifty years of age residing within the corporate limits of the City of Globe for the year commencing January 1, 1907, and each year thereafter.

SECTION II.

Said Street Tax shall be payable to the Supervisor of Streets of said City on demand. Whenever said tax has been paid the Supervisor of Streets shall deliver to the person thereto entitled, the proper receipt signed by the City Clerk of said City and countersigned by himself. All moneys collected by the Supervisor of Streets under this ordinance shall be paid by him to the City Treasurer and shall be kept in a separate fund to be known and designated as the street fund and shall be used for the improvement of streets and sidewalks only.

SECTION III.

Any person, firm or corporation having in his or their employ any person liable to pay the street tax as provided in Section I, shall, on demand being made by the Supervisor of Streets, furnish such Supervisor of Streets with an accurate list of the names of all such persons liable to payment of said street tax, and in case of any such persons liable to payment of said street tax, shall make default therein, as hereinafter provided, the person, firm or corporation so employing such person making such default, shall, on demand from the Supervisor of Streets, pay such Supervisor of Streets the amount so due for said street tax, and take a receipt therefor, which receipt shall constitute and become a good and sufficient set-off and payment for the amount therein named of any claim which said delinquent may have against such person, firm or corporation so taking such receipt and may be deducted in any subsequent settlement with said person, by any person, firm or corporation holding said receipt.

SECTION IV.

Any person who shall fail upon demand of the Supervisor of Streets to pay said tax as aforesaid, shall be punished by a fine of not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars and stand committed to the calaboose of the city until payment of such fine, not exceeding thirty days, or by confinement at hard labor upon the streets or public works of the city for a period of not less than five nor more than thirty days.

SECTION V.

This ordinance shall not apply to any active member of any volunteer fire department within the City of Globe; provided the evidence of the organization of the fire department and of the good standing of the member as required by law shall be filed with the City Clerk for each year.

SECTION VI.

This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

ORDINANCE NUMBER THIRTEEN

An Ordinance Regulating Prostitution.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Globe:

SECTION I.

It shall be unlawful for any prostitute, courtesan or lewd woman to engage in the business of prostitution or to reside in or occupy any building, room, shed or tent within the City of Globe for the purpose of engaging in prostitution therein unless she shall have first obtained from the City Marshal a permit to engage in such business and the occupation of such premises; provided, however, that the building, room, shed or tent shall be situated at least 400 yards in a direct line from any school house or other public building.

SECTION II.

It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to issue to any prostitute upon demand and the payment of the sum of Fifteen Dollars, a permit to engage in prostitution at a certain house of prostitution, specifically described in such permit for a term not exceeding three months, terminating with each quarter of the fiscal year; provided that the application fee for a permit issued during the quarter shall be pro rated; and provided further that the Marshal may exercise his discretion as to the place for which a permit may be issued.

It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to keep a correct record of the names and residences of each such applicant, which record shall be open to inspection at all times, and he shall account weekly to the City Clerk for all sums of money received for the issuance of such permits.

It shall be the duty of the holder of such permit to keep the same posted in a conspicuous place in her room, and it shall be the duty of each and every police officer and deputy marshal of the City of Globe to arrest any prostitute engaging in the business of prostitution in the City of Globe without a permit, or at any place other than the one specified in such permit.

SECTION III.

It shall be unlawful for any owner or agent of any owner or any person or persons to let, lease or rent for any length of time whatever to any woman of ill fame, any house, room or structure for the purpose of prostitution or assignation unless said woman of ill fame shall first have procured from the City Marshal a permit to occupy said house, room or structure.

SECTION IV.

Common reputation for unchastity or prostitution shall be competent and prima facie evidence of the character of persons arrested for violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION V.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than three hundred dollars, and stand committed to the calaboose of the city until the payment of such fine, not exceeding three months, or shall be confined at hard labor upon the streets or public works of the city for a period of not less than

five days nor more than thirty days.

SECTION VI.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after February 1st, 1907.

ORDINANCE NUMBER FOURTEEN

An Ordinance Regulating Sidewalks.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Globe:

SECTION I.

That it shall be unlawful for any one to repair or construct any sidewalk in the City of Globe, without permission from the Supervisor of Streets, and no new sidewalks shall be constructed until the street shall be surveyed and the width and grade of such sidewalk shall be determined, and when determined the sidewalks may be built according to the plans and specifications furnished by the City Engineer.

SECTION II.

The Mayor of the City of Globe may employ from time to time, with the approval of the Common Council, a competent civil engineer to make such surveys, plans and estimates as shall be necessary for the purposes of the City in the establishment of street and sidewalk grades and improvements, and to

do such other necessary and proper services as may from time to time be required of him by the Common Council.

SECTION III.

Any person violating the provisions of Section I aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

SECTION IV.

This ordinance shall go into effect February 1st, 1907.
