## LARGEST FORCE EVER EMPLOYED

### Gibson Mine Now Employing 130 Men—Mine in Better Shape than Ever

The Gibson mine is now employing the largest force of miners in its history. There are now employed at the mine 130 men and reports coming from the mine are very encouraging. The company has for some time been hampered by a lack of miners, but all the men who can be used at the mine are now employed.

Alderman S. L. Gibson, one of the owners of the mine, stated last evening that this month will be a record month for the mine, as the shipments have been the heaviest since the mine has been in operation.

**Demand for New Stock**

The officials of the new Globe-Arizona company have been flooded with request for allotments of stock of the company, despite the fact that they have not yet decided upon the price of the stock which will be placed on the local market. The property is well known among mining men of this section and there is hardly a question that the entire allotment will be taken up in record time. The fact that the company expects to be a shipper within sixty days and that the ore now in sight will pay all necessary development and operating expenses for some time to come have whetted the appetite of local investors.

**South Globe Has Ore**

A strike of rich sulphides is reported from the mine of the South Globe Development company. The shaft of the company is 125 feet deep and the ore is said to run high in copper.

**UNCOVER PREHISTORIC RUINS**

Large Number of Skeletons Found in Casa Grande Ruins

The excavation work at the Casa Grande ruins eight miles west of Phoenix, is about completed to the extent of the appropriation of \$3,000, with which the work has been carried on. Dr. Fewkes, under whose direction the work has been carried on, hopes that in a short time another appropriation may be made for a continuation of the excavating in these and other ruins in that immediate vicinity, says the Florence Blade. He is very well pleased with the results as far as the work has gone and his reports will be favorable for securing another appropriation. Any one who visited the old ruins before the recent work would scarcely know the place, such is the wonderful transformation which has been wrought. About forty rooms have been uncovered in the enclosure over which visitors walked a few months ago on a mound of dirt, and it is now a network of perfect walls from three to six feet in height. The main wall or enclosure is almost completely uncovered, only one corner remaining covered with the dirt. This main wall is four hundred feet long one way and two hundred and sixteen feet the other, the width ranging from three to five or six feet.

The work uncovered a great number of skeletons and innumerable implements of all sorts, and an immense lot of pottery of the most ancient and artistic design. One immense olla measuring almost seven feet in circumference was uncovered in a corner of one of the rooms and is almost as good as the day it was made, with the exception of a slight crumbling away of the upper edges and one crack which may possibly have been done in the recent excavation.

The base and tops of the walls have been finished off with cement to preserve them against washing away by rains and the whole enclosure has been arranged so as to give it a perfect drain and the condition of the whole ruin is now almost perfected to withstand the play of the elements for years to come.

The Casa Grande ruin is sure to be one of the principal points of interest for tourists in the west for years to come and merits all the care and attention bestowed upon it. The Southern Pacific will have a station at the ruins on their proposed line through the Casa Grande valley when this line is completed.

**Theaters in Berlin**

Of one sort or another, there are about thirty theaters in Berlin. The seating capacity varies from 1,600 (at the Belle Alliance) down to 820 (at the New). The principal theaters are royal houses, and confine their entertainments to performances of opera and classical drama. Playgoing is a much cheaper amusement in Berlin than it is in London, as the best seats in the house can usually be had for 8s, plus a booking fee of 5d. The performances begin, as a rule, at 7:30, and are over soon after 10 o'clock. The three royal houses are always closed during July and August, but the remainder are open all the year around. At a few of them matinees take place on Sundays. Some of the theaters, notably the New opera house, the Schiller and the Central, have gardens attached to them, in which popular concerts are given. Mr. Tree's forthcoming visit will probably be paid to the Royal. This is an exceptionally handsome building, erected in its original form about eighty-five years ago. Between 1890 and 1893, however, it was in great measure rebuilt.—Pall Mall Gazette.
