Honors in a debate in Columbia university last night were carried off by V. K. W. Koo, a Chinaman. This is the second time within a year that a foreign student has won the oratorical prize in Columbia. Koo is the son of Z. C. Koo, secretary of foreign affairs at Peking. He won a prize of \$18 given by the university for the best speech made in debate before the Philo-sophical society, one of the two prominent undergraduate debating societies at Columbia. The young Chinaman was judged the best of the seven men who spoke.

This is Koo's second year at Columbia, being a member of the class of 1909. He was unanimously elected to the 1909 Columbian board, defeating more than twenty of his classmates who were candidates.—New York Press.
