EYTING VERY SICK IN JAIL

Alleged Phoenix Murderer Under Care of Physician Constantly—Has Cell Mate Who Is an Artist—Spend Time Writing and Making Pictures.

Louis V. Eytting is a very sick man in his cell at the county jail, says the Gazette. Ever since he was brought back from California on the charge of murdering John Leicht the prisoner has been getting weaker and has been constantly under the care of a physician. Jail life is not what doctors usually prescribe and the confinement is telling greatly upon the health and spirits of the prisoner. On the eve of his trial he is still cheerful, while facing a terrible ordeal and suffering from a mortal illness. Still does he vigorously deny that he is guilty and declares that it is his only ambition in life to clear his name of the stigma of a murder charge. His trial comes up tomorrow morning in the district court. Three days have been allowed for the case. The case of Earl C. Griffenburgh, charged with embezzling a horse and buggy from the Club stables and a kodak from the Berryhill company, is set for Monday. It is probable, however, that the murder trial will consume much more time than three days. Griffenburgh is Eytting's cell mate,

and these two are the only white men in the jail. Griffenburgh spends most of his time drawing pictures, and attends to the wants of his invalid companion. Until he became too ill to write the accused murderer occupied himself in writing short stories, but increasing weakness has forced him to almost wholly abandon his literary work. He has announced that if he comes free on the murder charge and if bailed out of jail on the forgery accusation, he will publish a magazine should he regain his strength. He believes that he can make a great deal of money in this way, and a magazine gotten out by Eytting would certainly have a wide sale. But in the meantime his coming trial occupies most of his attention and he still remains confident that no jury will convict him on the evidence that will be offered.
