THE PROPOSED FRANCHISE

If the eastern parties who are now applying for a franchise from the city upon which depends the sale of the local water, gas and electric utilities, are in earnest, it will be a comparative easy matter for them to secure their franchise: No one supposes that they are coming here on a philanthropic mission; on the contrary, they expect to reap good returns from their investment. Nevertheless, if they are willing to give the city and public something of value in exchange for the franchise, the taxpayers will show little reluctance in granting it. The present plants are far too small for the city, which in the last few years has outgrown its utility plants, and if, as they state, they will spend from \$100,000 to \$150,000 in making the plants and service more adequate, no one will dispute that it will be a splendid thing for the city. Our water supply, which means also fire protection, is wholly inadequate, as are the electric and gas plants, and the companies which now control them are not financially able to meet the present growing needs of the public.

In addition to increased efficiency in the service, the new company should be called upon by the council to reduce the price of the commodities which they dispense. In the proposed ordinance there should be a clause stipulating the maximum rates that will be charged to property owners and other users for water, gas and electricity. These maximum rates should be lower than the present rates, which in some instances are exorbitant.

The franchise should provide for concessions to the city which have been mentioned by this newspaper in recent issues, which, however, are insignificant as compared with what has been stated above, a lower rate for the public. The franchise should contain the rate which would be charged the city for flushing sewers when the system will have been installed and for other purposes.

If the people who desire the franchise are the right sort of people, with no consuming desire to hog things, they will meet the people at least half way. And it is the duty of the city council to see to it that these things are contained in the franchise before it is put up to the people, whose servants they are.

THE RED FLAG IN CHICAGO

unanticipated result as the same thing here. Our parades proved that there are two sorts of labor, and even two sorts of unionists. The one sort regard themselves like other people, no better, no worse, subject to the same laws—statutory and economic—as other people, and marked by hardly anything in particular to distinguish them from other people. They are simply American citizens. The other sort are the red-flaggers, who boast themselves a class apart. They have class grievances, which they demand shall be redressed by some particular action. They are not characteristically American citizens, even though some Americans may sympathize or act with them.

According to our Chicago telegram of the 4,000 paraders "several hundred" were contributed by one Polish society, which sang its song of revolution. The demonstration turned out to be "almost wholly an anarchistic affair" and was "little patronized by the trades unions." The addresses denounced "class privileges" and "capital." Their favorite banner proclaimed them proudly "undesirable citizens," and we should suppose that if Haywood knew of their support he would think his chances of a fair trial more prejudiced by them than by anything done by the president.

Offensive as such demonstrations are, they have a use. It is a good thing for those of this way of thinking to let everybody know exactly what they are thinking, and to put themselves and their ideas on exhibition for general appraisal. They are entitled to all the support they can attract, and they must pay the penalty of whatever opposition they create.—New York Times.
