MORE DEALS IN PINAL DISTRICT

Several Good Mining Properties Are Bonded for Large Amounts

Final county's mining boom continues to expand and one could hardly fire a long range rifle in the hills of this section without hitting some mining man who is looking for a copper property to bond or buy, says the Florence Blade.

Four more groups, situated in the vicinity of Winkelman, were taken up on working bonds this week, and partial payments were made in each instance.

Engineer Benedict and associates, of Nevada, obtained a bond on the Jacob Snyder group, which adjoins the O'Carroll group on the west. We could not ascertain the amount or terms of the bond.

The Nevadans also bonded the McHugh group, which adjoins the Snyder group on the west and north, for \$120,000, paying 10 per cent down.

Nevadans also obtained bonds on the Seventy-nine mine and the O'Brien and Wilson properties which surround the Seventy-nine. The price on the Seventy-nine is \$60,000, of which Judge George Scott gets \$10,000, Robert Brauman \$10,000, J. I. Coleman \$10,000, Jack Branaman \$10,000 and Dennis O'Brien \$20,000. We could not ascertain the amounts to be paid for the O'Brien, the Wilson and the Snyder groups.

All of these properties will, we believe, develop into large producers as they are situated in the Christmas ore zone in which some of the largest high-grade ore bodies in Arizona have been uncovered. Developments at the O'Carroll group prove the continuation of the Christmas ore beds into that ground and there is ample evidence that they continue on west through the other properties above mentioned.
