MARKET CLOSES MUCH WEAKER

Absolutely No Buying Power in Coppers—Old Dominion Was Pressed for Sale Today—Professionals Expect a Rally.

GLOBE, June 13.—Old Dominion was the feature in the copper market today. The only explanation of the decline was that a large block was offered on a narrow market. Jackson & Curtis were heavy buyers at the close. We believe Old Dominion intrinsically cheap at the present prices.
Walker Brothers of New York say: Market today was very dull and without feature. The trading was entirely professional, and the changes were slight. We do not look for much activity this week, but think the market holds very well and undertone is strong. Professionals here expect a good rally.
Foster of Payne Webber says: One by one the coppers were sagging of their own weight. There is absolutely no buying power for any block coming on the market and any bad moves will break any stock several points. Yesterday it was Utah, today it is Old Dominion. I must repeat my advice of the past few months to sell stocks and stay out of the market for the time being or go short and stay with them.

NEW YORK, June 13.—Copper was lower in the English market, spot closing at £96 5s, a decline of £1, and futures 15s 6d lower at £93 5s. Locally the market was dull and nominal, with Lake, 24.00 to 24.50; Electrolytic, 22.75 to 23.25; Casting, 21.75 to 22.25.
Lead was unchanged at 5.75 to 5.85 locally, but advanced 2s 6d to £20 7s 6d in London.
Spelter was unchanged at £24 7s 6d in London and 6.40 to 6.50 locally.
Iron was lower in the English market, with standard foundry 57s 6d; Cleveland warrants, 57s 9d. Locally unchanged.
