IN THE LIMELIGHT AGAIN

Furthermore, they contracted to sell for a term of years all the barbed wire he could make. 'Ellwood borrowed \$1,000 and set up a little factory. A few years later on he had paid back that loan, and was worth a small matter of \$15,000,000 besides.'—New York Sun.
