COOPER NOT TOO HIGH John E. Stanton Can See No Reason for a Reduction in Prices

John R. Stanton, the Lake copper mine owner, contributed something to the controversy over the public course of the copper market.

"The situation is as strong as it was a year ago, from the standpoint of production and consumption," Mr. Stanton said.

"It is my opinion that if there were a reaction in copper, a buying movement of ordinary proportions would result in an immediate restoration of prices to the high level of the year."

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SALES OF METAL EXPECTED SOON

Walker Thinks that Producers Will Make Concessions on 60 Days Supplies

George L. Walker says in his last copy letter: The copper market was dull this week so far as actual business was concerned, but the period of inactivity that has existed for several months will soon be broken, quite likely within a few days, and sales of the metal in large quantities at a moderate concession from the existing level of prices will probably be announced.

This is the period of the year when manufacturers take account of stock, the fiscal year of many corporations ending June 30. This accounts for some of the holding off on purchases of new copper until near the beginning of the new fiscal year.

Consumers' supplies of the metal are very low, and it is believed that there will be very little surplus copper available in the market after they have contracted for their nearby requirements.

The Copper Share Market A good degree of activity has developed in the coppers during the past week, and, as I have predicted, activity has brought higher prices.

No other group of stocks holds out such good promise of profits as the coppers. Sales of copper for future delivery probably will be reported soon, and the price is likely to go higher than the public has expected.

The average price of copper this year will be higher than for 1906. The earnings of all the producing companies will be greater. Dividend distributions will be increased.

The public will find that the stocks which it has been selling have been taken by the big copper interests, and that when the public wants to buy them back, as it will, it will have to pay higher prices.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the INDEPENDENT MEAT COMPANY Know All Men by These Presents: That we, the undersigned and herein-after designated incorporators, have this day voluntarily associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming and creating a corporation under the laws of the Territory of Arizona, and therefore do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I. The names of the incorporators are: Chas. H. Edmondson, William P. Rose, H. V. Snell, J. A. McIntyre and Ginn Ah Quong, all of Globe, Gila County, Arizona, and the name of this corporation is and shall be: INDEPENDENT MEAT COMPANY.

ARTICLE II. The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation is as follows: To do a general wholesale and retail butcher business; to deal in, buy and sell all kinds of fresh, salted and cured meats, live and dressed poultry; to deal in all kinds of general merchandise; to erect, operate and maintain cold storage plants; to manufacture ice; to erect, operate and maintain electric lighting and power plants; to issue bonds, debentures, mortgages, or other obligations and secure the same by mortgage or lien on any of the property, franchises or rights of this corporation; to deal in, buy, sell or otherwise acquire the stocks, bonds or securities of other corporations, firms or individuals.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is and shall be the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars, divided into two thousand shares of the par value of Twenty-five Dollars each, and when issued shall be fully paid in cash, and shall thereafter be non-assessable.

ARTICLE IV. The corporate existence of this corporation shall commence on the day of the filing of these Articles of Incorporation in the office of the County Recorder of Gila County, Arizona, and a certified copy thereof with the Auditor of this Territory, and shall continue for a period of twenty-five years thereafter.

ARTICLE V. The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, consisting of not less than five, nor more than fifteen, who shall be stockholders of this corporation, to be elected annually at the annual meetings of the stockholders, and the number decided upon and elected at any annual election shall constitute the Board of Directors for that year.

ARTICLE VI. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall at any time subject itself shall in no case exceed Thirty Thousand Dollars.

ARTICLE VII. The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be exempt from debts of any kind whatsoever.
