THE DISCLOSURES ARE SENSATIONAL

Papers Found on Mexican Revolutionists Show that Roosevelt Was to Share Fate in Store for Diaz—Brilliant Woman in Scheme.

It has been definitely announced that Magon and Villareal, the Mexican revolutionists, recently arrested in Los Angeles, will be tried in Cochise county. A Los Angeles paper publishes the substance of several letters which were found on the men at the time of their arrest. The disclosures are summed up as follows:

"Terrific abuse, spread around the world, against Theodore Roosevelt. Evidence tending to show that Roosevelt was to share the fate in store for Diaz.

"The existence in Los Angeles of a brilliant and bold woman anarchist who dared more than any of the men.

"Written statements of prominent revolutionists showing that the attacks upon Cananea, Douglas and Juarez were all planned by the gang recently arrested in Los Angeles.

"Plot to collect money in Spain by working on the hatred supposed to exist there toward the hero of San Juan Hill.

"All these things have been found in letters confiscated by the Mexican government from the effects of Ricardo Flores Magon, Villareal and Riviera, arrested after a fierce struggle recently in a house on Pico street.

"Hidden somewhere in Los Angeles is a dare-devil Spanish woman who should be standing with the Mexican revolutionists when they are arraigned here in the United States court.

"Letters recently confiscated show that she was the most daring and reckless anarchist of all the band. Her name is Maria Talavera. She is said to be a beautiful and attractive woman. Her friends and even her husband regarded her as a quiet housewife, intent on cooking frijoles. But in her frying pans she was seething men fighting; bearing in the sizzle of the grease the crash of arms, the pound of horses' feet and the din and commotion of a nation's government overthrow.

"She was the go-between and fiery inspiration of the plotters who had their headquarters in Los Angeles. Some of the terrible letters that have been seized show that she was recently intrusted with some dreadful secret mission into Chihuahua—probably the assassination of some high Mexican official.

"Magon in his letters speaks of arms having been sent and says that Maria never asks whether she will be in danger of death when sent on a mission. If assigned to kill a tyrant, he says, she will do so or make all the necessary arrangements.

"Some of the confiscated documents indicate that certain Los Angeles newspapers might find a better use for their sentimental tears. The halo of martyrdom for these revolutionists—Magon and his pals—do not fit well."

Superior Consul Elias of Tucson, who is in the city, yesterday said that he had been aware of the existence of the letters, as had also United States Attorney Alexander. Mr. Elias said that the murderous woman mentioned in the letters, the revolutionists' instrument of assassination, had been located and she would shortly be arrested.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF "THE GOLDEN COPPER MINING COMPANY"

Know All Men by These Presents: That we, the undersigned, have this day associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the Territory, and to this end for the purpose adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be THE GOLDEN COPPER MINING COMPANY, and the names of the incorporators are R. S. Knowles of San Carlos, Arizona; F. P. Burnett of Globe, Gila County, Arizona Territory; A. N. Lewis and John Blake of Stanley, Graham County, Arizona Territory.

ARTICLE II.

The principal place of business of this corporation shall be in the Town of Globe in Gila County, Arizona Territory, but it may maintain such other offices within or without this Territory as shall be directed by its Board of Directors where meetings may be held and all corporate business may be transacted.

ARTICLE III.

The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be one million (1,000,000) dollars divided into one million shares of the par value of one dollar each, and such stock shall at the date of its issuance be fully paid and forever non-assessable in money, property, labor or other valuable thing, and the judgment of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive as to the value thereof.

ARTICLE IV.

The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be at the date of the filing of its Articles of Incorporation with the Territorial auditor and shall continue for a period of twenty-five years thereafter.

ARTICLE V.

The general nature of the business proposed to transact is to do a general mining business, to locate, lease, operate, buy and sell mines and mining claims; to own, lease, buy and sell real estate or other property; to conduct and operate a general merchandising business; to buy, own or build railroads and operate the same; to locate and construct waterways and water locations, and in fact to do or carry on the business in the same manner that a natural person could do. To buy, sell and hypothecate stocks either of this or any other corporation in the manner which the Board of Directors may deem proper.

ARTICLE VI.

The affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors who shall be elected on the first day of April, 1908, and on that date yearly thereafter, in the manner as shall be provided by the By-Laws.

ARTICLE VII.

The highest amount of indebtedness to which this corporation at any one time shall subject itself shall be the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars.

ARTICLE VIII.

The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be and is hereby made forever exempt from all liabilities for its debts or obligations.
