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THE M'KINLEY MONUMENT IN BUFFALO.

It was on Sept. 5, 1901, that the late William McKinley made his famous speech, advocating reciprocity with all countries and especially friendly relations with the countries of this continent, at the Pan-American exposition in Buffalo. The next day he was shot down by Czolgosz. On Sept. 5 of this year Buffalo dedicates a noble monument to his memory. It is of pure white Vermont marble and stands in Niagara square, in the central part of the city. At the base are four lions, the work of the well known animal sculptor, A. T. Hamster Proctor. The cost, \$105,000, was defrayed by the legislature.

KIBBEY TALKS OF IRRIGATION MEET
 Says Arizona Played an Important Part in the Irrigation Congress and That He Will Try to Capture the 1909 Meeting for the Territory.
 Rather tired from his journey, but thoroughly satisfied with the National Irrigation congress recently ended at Sacramento, Governor J. H. Kibbey arrived in Phoenix this morning and is performing his duties at the capitol as usual, says the Arizona Democrat.
 Speaking of the congress, Governor Kibbey said: "The proceedings of the congress at Sacramento have received wide publicity and there is nothing which I can add on that subject."
 "I can say, however, that Arizona played an important part in the congress. The delegates from this territory have been regular attendants in the past, and are therefore becoming well known, and in that way have acquired considerable prestige among the leaders of the irrigation movement."
 "Ample evidence of this fact is shown by the election of B. A. Fowler, one of the delegates from this territory, to the office of secretary of the next convention, which will meet in Albuquerque next fall at a date still to be arranged."
 "Delegated Twitchell of New Mexico, a brother of the mining man here, moved that Albuquerque be the place of the next convention. Walla Walla, Wash., was the only other applicant, and New Mexico was the successful candidate. On behalf of Arizona, I moved that the congress meet in Albuquerque."
 "The year following the congress will probably meet in Washington, and the next year I want Arizona to have the honor. We are not quite ready for it yet. After the Roosevelt reservoir project is completed, and the irrigation systems of this valley are perfected, we will be in a position to make a much better showing to the delegates of other states."
 "Besides, it costs something to entertain one of these congresses. The city of Sacramento raised \$55,000 for the convention. A good share of the money went to decorating the city. I have seen nothing finer than the displays in evidence there. All the principal buildings were decorated and at the intersections of the streets were banners with the names of the various states and territories represented in the convention."
 "At one corner was an arch made in the form of an old Dutch windmill. It was fitted up with electric lights, and at night made a very effective display when it was revolving. In short, the whole thing was magnificent. I heard one delegate say that the displays were much better than the Mardi Gras in New Orleans."
 "There were 1,800 delegates registered at the congress, and of these California contributed about 500. Of the rest Arizona had her thirty-six delegates and made a better showing than the average. Each state and territory was entitled to ten votes, irrespective of its representation. Moreover, each state and territory was allowed one vote to each delegate up to twenty. Thus some of the states were cut short of their full representation, while others did not have delegates enough to come up to their maximum number of votes."
 Governor Kibbey had a very interesting conversation with Vice President Fairbanks and also E. H. Harriman. The latter he found quite affable and willing to talk. An illustration of Harriman's astuteness, however, was evidenced in the course of a speech which he made before the congress.
 One of the members interrupted Harriman to ask a pointed question in the answer to which the public at large would be greatly interested. But the railroad magnate, by way of reply, merely pointed with a smile at the row of newspaper men down in front of him, who were sitting at attention. The silent answer provoked a roar of laughter from the audience, the reporters themselves joining heartily.
 Whatever there may have been of political significance or of public interest attached to Governor Kibbey's conference with Vice President Fairbanks, the governor does not care to make public, merely saying that it was a friendly talk.

Asked about statehood, Kibbey said there was nothing new that he could say.
