At 7:30 no verdict having been reached, and none being in sight, Judge Lawlor sent the trial twelve to the Fairmount hotel for dinner and himself went to his club, saying that he could be found later at the theater if the jury had anything to report. If no verdict should be reached by 11:30, he said the jury would be locked up for the night in rooms at the Fairmount.

HURLED 40 FEET TO DEATH BY CAR

Unidentified Man Struck by a Fast Electric Car and Instantly Killed

LOS ANGELES, Cal., October 4.—An unidentified man was instantly killed last night near a station on the Pacific Electric Long Beach line called Graham by being struck by the Catalina Flyer, a fast electric train running between this city and San Pedro.

The motorman of the Catalina train approached the station of Graham, he noticed a man crossing the tracks ahead.

Before the air could be applied to the brakes the swiftly moving electric train struck the man, throwing him forty feet. His mutilated body fell far to one side of the right of way.

Eye witnesses to the accident stated that the man had alighted from a Long Beach car bound toward that city and had stepped to the opposite tracks before he became aware that a train was approaching. The glare of the headlights on the approaching train confused the man and his instant death followed.

The body was brought to Pierce Brothers' morgue. Up to a late hour last night it had not been identified.

FRICK PAYS \$100,000 FOR GRAND OPERA BOX
Steel Magnate Gives Highest Price on Record at Metropolitan

NEW YORK, October 4.—Henry C. Frick, the Pittsburgh steel millionaire, has paid \$100,000 for box 19 in the Metropolitan opera house.

This is the highest sum ever paid for a box in the Metropolitan's "diamond horseshoe."

James B. Haggin in 1903 bought Heber R. Bishop's box No. 9 for \$80,000. The prevailing price before that was \$30,000.

Frick has secured box No. 19 by purchasing the late Henry I. Barbey's stock in the Metropolitan opera house.
