## GLOBE SIGHTS AND SILVER BELTLETS

### Current News of Busy Globe Told in Brevities

**Changes Hands.**—Yesterday a deal was closed whereby W. H. Maher sold the St. Louis saloon, 418 North Broad street, to Ole Smith, who is now in charge.

**Important Meeting.**—A call published elsewhere gives notice of a meeting of school patrons in District No. 1, to be held in Maurel hall Friday night. The object of the meeting is to consider a more central point for the erection of the new school building to be built in North Globe.

**Sad News.**—The many friends of Mrs. W. L. Decker will be sorry to learn of the death of her mother at Westpoint, Iowa, recently.

**Plain Drunks.**—Six plain drunks were arraigned in Justice Thomas' court yesterday and were given the usual prescription—ten days or ten dollars.

**Vaccination Compulsory.**—It is a fact not known to many Globe people, but nevertheless a fact, that vaccination of all children before they enter public schools is required by the law of the territory of Arizona. Such a measure was passed at the last session of the legislature and is now in effect. Whether or not the law is being enforced in any part of the territory and whether or not any steps will be taken in Globe to enforce a compliance with the same, the Silver Belt is not in position to state, but gives the information as a matter of news.
