**Palace Market Closes.**—The Palace meat market, which has been in operation for a number of months under the management of J. A. McIntyre, was closed yesterday. The stock and fixtures were purchased by the Independent market. The closing of the Palace was made necessary by the arrest of Mr. McIntyre on a charge of murder alleged to have been committed in the Indian Territory ten years ago.

## FLOOD WASHED CLIFTON HAD SCHOOL TROUBLES

The territorial board of control held a meeting yesterday afternoon, but there was little to attend to save routine business. One matter of general interest came up and that was the progress of work on the Clifton schoolhouse, a demand being filed for \$4,740 for material and \$630 for labor, or a total to date of \$5,370. This schoolhouse stands in rather a peculiar class. Previous to the Twenty-third legislature the schoolhouse was washed away by a flood. The district had nothing to hand to build a new one and the legislature appropriated a sum for rebuilding it. Before it was fairly completed another flood washed the new schoolhouse away and the legislature at the last session appropriated \$7,500 more for another schoolhouse, to which was to be added what was left unspent of the former appropriation. Of this fund there was about \$2,500 and the people have now subscribed \$5,000 more, so when the schoolhouse is completed it will be a \$15,000 structure. It is anchored this time so it is believed the next flood will be unable to jar it loose.—Arizona Republican.

## JAP SAILORS TO REPLACE INTEMPERATE NORWEGIANS

MOBILE, Ala., October 10.—Nearly all the vessels in the Central American fruit trade will, it is said, within the next few days, replace Norwegian laborers with Chinese. Norwegian owners, it is said, concluded that owing to the unsatisfactory labor of their countrymen, their unreliability and intemperate habits and the number of desertions, partly on account of the interference of boarding house runners, that they no longer will employ them.
