## EPIDEMIC MURDER CONTINUES IN GRAHAM

TWO HAVE BEEN KILLED OUT-RIGHT AND ANOTHER IS EXPECTED TO DIE.

MEXICANS AND NEGROES ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE BLOOD SPILLING.

Tragedies Were Enacted in Safford, Metcalf and Clifton—Murderers are still at Large—Thirty-Two Cases Awaiting Grand Jury.

Special to the Silver Belt. SOLOMONVILLE, Ariz., October 24.—The epidemic of crime in Graham county continues unabated. So far this week two murders are to be recorded and another vicious attack which will probably end in murder. At Safford Tuesday evening a man named Domingo Gutierrez, employed as a section hand, was shot and killed near the little cabins where the men employed in that capacity live. No one saw the killing, although persons living at that place and noticed a man running away. It is practically certain that a companion named Timoteo Barajas is the murderer as he is missing from his cabin and a number of incidents connect him directly with the killing. The officers have been searching for Barajas, but have not been able to locate him. At Metcalf a day or two ago a Mexican named Galdiron killed a fellow countryman whose name has not been learned here. The killing was the result of a quarrel and the survivor fled to the hills and has not been captured. At Clifton a negro took a couple of

shots at a woman of his own color and her death is expected. The man was jailed.

The number of cases now awaiting investigation by the grand jury has increased to thirty-two and the end is not yet in sight.

Inquiry at the sheriff's office elicits the information that George Young, against whom the clerk of the Gila county court issued an execution for \$300 recently, has not yet produced the cash. He has property sufficient to pay the amount several times.

The guests were assembled shortly before 8 o'clock and promptly at that hour the orchestra struck the chords of the beautiful song, "Answer," which was rendered very effectively by Mr. William Cummings, and on the completion of which Mrs. R. B. Hegardt in her usual charming manner sang "Oh, Promise Me." Then came the bridal march from Lohengrin, the first strains of which ushered in the bridal party.

As the bridal party started from the south entry of the church, Rev. George Selby, the officiating rector, was followed from the vestry to the chancel by the groom and groomsmen, Mr. Howard T. Wayne. The ushers were Messrs. A. J. Merrill, E. W. Armstrong, Leslie George and Dr. H. S. McGee, who led the bridal procession, followed by the bride's attendants, Miss Coles, Mrs. Weinberger, Mrs. Nave and Mrs. Barker, all of whom wore white with cosmos wreaths and carried bouquets of yellow ragged chrysanthemums. Immediately preceding the bride was the matron of honor, Mrs. F. C. Alsdorf, her sister, who wore an elaborate princess





## FAVORS SCHOOL ON PASCOE HILL

W. S. CROWE THINKS NOTFSGER HILL CONTINGENT HAS BEEN "FILLING" THE SILVER BELT, AND GIVES HIS REASONS.

Globe, Ariz., October 24, 1907. To the Editor of the Silver Belt:

There appeared in yesterday's issue of the Silver Belt a short news item relative to the north side new school building.

Now, I do not know where you obtained the information printed, but it sounds like Nofstger hill talk, or the school trustees' side of the controversy. You say that the majority of citizens favor the present site chosen by the trustees. That is a fact if you take Nofstger hill for the city of Globe.

You hit the nail on the head when mention was made of much property having been bought since last June, when it became known that the trustees had decided to build the schoolhouse on Nofstger hill. It is a question of getting desirable property at the expense of the public service and taxpayers who are to pay the freight on this proposition.

The school trustees ignored the electors of the Globe district in the selection of the two schoolhouse sites. When the law provides that the electors shall choose the site for any new school building. As soon as it became known to the west side residents and those residing down Pinal creek that the trustees were going to build the house on Nofstger hill, protest was made to the trustees. They were asked to call a meeting of the electors to choose the site; all to no avail.

The site chosen is in the northeast corner of the townsite and acceptable only to those residing in its vicinity. I prefer a more central location and easier of access. Pascoe hill is a much better site for all parties concerned. I suppose that the children on the east side from the courthouse wash north to the north line of the district and those on the west side of Pinal creek will all have to attend this school except those in the higher grades.

The cry is raised that \$2,000 has already been spent on the building. There has been no contract let that in any way binds the public money, although it might bind the trustees personally.

I lay no accusations at the door of the trustees, except that they allowed themselves to be influenced by a few property owners who are willing to condone a wrong if it only enhances the value of their property.

If this matter comes to a vote I, for one elector, intend to vote to put this schoolhouse on Pascoe hill, or any other place except where it is—speculators or no speculators.

As to the trustees, notice was brought to them before they ever started the building and if matters go against them, no apologies are due.
