SHORT STORIES OF THE CITY

Gone to Phoenix.—John Warren, who has been teaming for the Warrior Copper company, leaves today with his team for Phoenix, where he has some contract work to do.

Returns with Prisoner.—Undersheriff Ralph Sturgis, who has been absent from the city for a number of days, returned last night from St. Johns, via Phoenix, having in charge Tom Hastings, who is wanted here on a charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses. He will probably have a hearing in Justice Rawlings' court this afternoon.

Granted a Divorce.—In district court yesterday Laura Hackney was granted a divorce from her husband on the grounds of desertion and failure to provide. Attorney George K. French appeared for the plaintiff.

The Lawyers of Globe.—It may be advisable for the territorial examining board for the admission of candidates to the bar to hold its next meeting at Globe. Only three applicants have come in under the new law and all of them reside at the capital of Gila county. The application of the last, Norman J. Johnson, was received yesterday—Arizona Republican. There is no doubt but what such an arrangement would be highly satisfactory to the Globe applicants and the members of the board who are fond of metropolitan life, but as a matter of fact, there will be about seven applicants for admission to practice at the bar, three from Globe, two from Bisbee, one from Tucson and one from Tombstone.

President Kimball Coming.—Andrew Kimball of Thatcher, president of the Mormon colonies of southern Arizona, is looked to reach Globe Saturday night and will hold divine services in the Mormon meeting house on Sunday, October 29, at the following hours: 10 a. m., 2 p. m. and 7:30 p. m. A cordial invitation is extended to the public to attend the meetings. President Kimball will be accompanied by his counselor, John Nash, and others.

Story Denied.—Phoenix papers announce that Sheriff Thompson is in that city having in custody a horse thief, recently captured, who is wanted in this county. Mr. Thompson was in Phoenix the first of the week in company with Deputy Sturgis, who had Tom Hastings in charge, but the sheriff was empty handed and is now at Florence, where he was called as a witness in mining suits.

Copper Hill School.—W. O. Kellner, county superintendent of public instruction, returned yesterday evening from a visit to the school at Copper Hill. Mr.

Kellner says that the new school building at Copper Hill, recently completed, is one of the best outside of Globe in the county. Thirty-six pupils are enrolled and are making fine progress under the direction of Miss Margaret McLain. The county superintendent will visit Warrior and Live Oak today.

Discharged.—Stephen Robergetis, who was arrested Wednesday night on a charge of assault and battery, had a hearing in Justice Thomas' court yesterday. Coranto Javana was the complaining witness, but failed to make a case.

Pleasant Reception.—The reception tendered Mrs. Neidig, president of the Arizona lodge Fraternal Brotherhood, at Union hall on Wednesday evening, marks the brightest page in the social history of this growing and prosperous society. There was an unusually large turnout of members. A musical and literary program and the service of refreshments, together with the faultless work of the team, were the chief features of the evening.

Federal Grand Jury.—The federal grand jury for the Globe session of the United States district court will, in all probability, be called on December 4. There are quite a number of transgressors charged with selling liquor to Indians to be investigated, but no criminal cases of any great importance.

Jury Denied.—In the case of the City vs. Ruth Baum, called in Justice Thomas' court yesterday, the application of Attorney French for a jury trial was denied, and this morning, under mandamus proceedings undertaken by the defendant, Justice Thomas will be compelled to appear before Judge Nave and show cause why a jury trial should not be accorded Miss Baum. The case will be called again in Justice Thomas' court on Saturday afternoon, when it will be tried either to the justice or to a jury, as the upper court may decide. The Baum woman, a lady of the tenderloin, is held on a charge of violating ordinance No. 33.

Hearing Today.—A. Starke, a half-brother of O. Starke, the tailor who fed the city rather unceremoniously about two weeks ago, leaving a long string of mourners, is confined in the county jail on a charge of feloniously withholding information regarding the disposition of certain goods in the possession of his half-brother before the flight of the latter. The charge is equivalent to that of an accessory. Young Starke claims that he knows nothing whatever of the goods in question, and at his hearing today in Justice Rawlings' court it will be up to the authorities to prove that he does. Attorney Jacobs represents the accused.

House and Lot Purchased and a Chapel to Be Erected—Subscriptions Being Taken

The Evangelical Lutheran synod of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Nebraska and other states has purchased a house and lot on Devereaux street. This will be the permanent residence of the missionaries, Rev. J. F. G. Harders, superintendent of the mission work among the Apaches, and of Rev. E. Becknagel. There will be a chapel erected on this property in which services will be held every Sunday for the Apaches and which will serve as a center of the Indian mission work around Globe. Soliciting for the erection of this chapel has been begun and the missionaries hope to meet with success.

RAN ONTO OPEN BRIDGE

Chicago Street Car Nearly Drowned on End by Jackknife Wood

CHICAGO, October 24.—Shooting suddenly upward at an angle that grew to 45 degrees, the foremost car of a train on the Metropolitan L dashed on the opening lift of the jackknife draw-bridge between Jackson boulevard and Van Buren street last night.

In darkness and amid crashing glass from shattered windows, the startled passengers were hurled from their seats and, sliding toward the downward end of the coach, groped for the exits. Fortunately, the number in the car was small, and all succeeded in escaping from the heap into which they were thrown.

The jumble of cars on the bridge closed that structure subsequently to all traffic and for some time the Metropolitan system was almost entirely tied up. Coming just at the time of the closing of the theaters, it caught many persons bound for home.

GOMPERS MAKES CLEAR OPPOSITION TO TAFT

CHICAGO, October 24.—President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor today reiterated his former announcement that he will oppose any man who favors government by injunction. In an address before the Chicago Federation of Labor he maintained that the right of free speech and free press were a natural right and could not be taken away by the abuse of the injunction. While not mentioning Secretary of War Taft by name, he made it plain that he referred to that official's aspirations for the presidency.

HETTY GREEN LOSES SUIT

Receiver Recovers Judgment for \$18,244 Which She Was Overpaid

NASHVILLE, Tenn., October 24.—Park Marshall, who was receiver in the case of Guyton against Warner, involving the Union stockyards here, has been awarded a judgment of \$18,244 against Mrs. Hetty Green of New York.

Mrs. Green was a stockholder in the company and the receiver overpaid her the amount allowed in the judgment. She failed to take notice of a letter regarding the mistake and is taxed with the costs of the action.

WOULD PUNISH PHYSICIANS

Doctor Declares Law Should Reach Procrastinations as to Operations

CHICAGO, October 24.—"I think the time is due to punish by law delay in diagnosis and operation for appendicitis." Such was the warning expressed in an address by Dr. W. S. Hoy, president of the American Association of Railway Surgeons.

"The practice of procrastination in all acute infections should no longer be tolerated by the profession, and will not by the public," he added.

DAN O'LEARY COMPLETES TASK

Walked Mile Each Hour for Over Nine Hundred Hours

CINCINNATI, Ohio, October 24.—Dan O'Leary, the 64-year-old pedestrian who, forty-one days ago, started to walk a mile every hour until he had completed 1,000 miles, finished his 986th mile at 4 o'clock this afternoon. He is in good condition and is expected to complete his thousandth mile at 7 o'clock tomorrow morning.
