## THIEVES FOLLOW A PRESCOTT MAN

### HAD \$3,000 IN HIS POSSESSION AND WAS SHADOWED IN PHOENIX—A PECULIAR CHAIN OF INCIDENTS IN THIS CASE.

PHOENIX, Ariz., November 2.—Confident that he is being pursued by thieves who are trying to rob him of \$3,000 which they think he has in his possession, M. Anderson has enlisted the efforts of the city police to locate the men and place them under arrest.

Anderson arrived here recently from Yavapai county with \$3,000 which he obtained from the sale of mining claims in the northern part of Arizona. This he prudently placed in the bank almost as soon as he reached town, but he mentioned the fact of his having the money to numerous friends about town, and it is supposed that the statement reached the ears of some person or persons who could use the money and were not very particular about the method of acquiring it.

At any rate, as he was walking past the old Gibson stables Monday night on his way to his room at the Jefferson lodging house on East Jefferson street, two men emerged from the shadow of a high adobe wall, evidently with the idea of accosting Anderson. But he had his wits with him and told them to be on their way or he would use his personal influence to that end. They accordingly disappeared.

It is supposed, however, that they followed him home, for that night the room adjoining Anderson's was entered and a pair of trousers was stolen from it. Tuesday night, another room in close proximity to that occupied by Anderson was broken into by thieves and a pocketbook, containing a small sum of money, was taken. One of the burglars was seen immediately after the act and is described as being a large, heavy-set man, although it was too dark to distinguish his features accurately.

The police have thus far been unable to locate this man or to implicate others in the robbery, and the description furnished is rather too meager to admit of much hope of effecting a capture. Anderson himself is not worrying particularly about the affair since his money is safely deposited where thieves do not break through and steal, but he does not dislike the obvious impudience that he is so lacking in business sense as to carry so large a sum of money around upon his person.

## GLOBE IS PUSHING FORWARD DESPITE THE SLUMP IN RED METAL

Joe Scott, former sheriff of this county, who is now engaged in mining in the Globe district, arrived in Tucson last evening and will remain here for several days. Mr. Scott since he left official life in this county has maintained his residence here, but has been engaged in mining in Sonora and throughout Arizona.

"In the Globe district curtailment is noticeable, but I do not believe that our district has been affected as much as some of the others in Arizona," remarked Mr. Scott.

"The Old Dominion, which is the largest operating company, has laid off one-fourth of the normal force. Among the smaller companies that have been

working in the Globe district there has also been curtailment, but only to a limited extent.

"The development of new bodies in the Globe district shows that there are vast ore bodies there yet to be uncovered. Daily good strikes are being made of very rich ore."

Mr. Scott is working on a property in which Councilman Mose Drachman and other Tucsonians are interested.—Tucson Citizen.

## PRACTICAL JOKERS' VICTIM

### Repentant Shepherd Given Whisky and He Dies in Manger

LAS VEGAS, N. M., November 2.—Calyouel, an aged white shepherd, came to Roswell yesterday, became heartily drunk, professed religion, and prayed for the salvation of his soul at a Salvation Army meeting, where he gave up his last dollar.

He was later taken in hand by practical jokers, who filled him with so much more whisky that he died during the night in the manger of a livery stable, where he was thrown when he became utterly helpless.

## MAMMOTH METEOR FELL AT PRESCOTT

### WEIGHT ESTIMATED AT EIGHT THOUSAND TONS—IT IS FORTY-SEVEN FEET LONG AND HALF THE WIDTH—DEPTH UNKNOWN.

The world's greatest meteor, if statistics are to be considered, found a home in the Jerome mining district last week. The Jerome Belt says of it:

"The weight of the Jerome meteor is largely problematical, but eight thousand tons would not be a wild guess. It is forty-seven feet long and half that wide, with an undeveloped depth.

"The hole made in the earth by the impact of this meteor is something to be marveled at. The depression has a general resemblance to a crater, and a superficial glance conveys the impression that it is really the crater of a volcano which became extinct ages ago. Geologists, however, will observe that the rim around the crater-like depression is not composed of volcanic outpourings. The hole is found to penetrate from forty to eighty feet of red sandstone, then from two hundred and fifty to three hundred and fifty feet of yellowish limestone, then a light gray sandstone, and finally a brownstone in which it terminates."

## RAZORBACK AND BEAR FIGHT

### No, Gentle Reader, This Is Not One of Those Nature Fakers

MANITOU, Colo., November 2.—If the brown bear that limped to its den in the mountains yesterday after being routed by an Arkansas razorback hog will call at the ranch of Grove brothers it will find its antagonist dying from its wounds.

The bear crept up to the hog yesterday and seized it by its leg. The hog turned on the bear, and for half an hour there was a fierce battle. Both animals were gashed and gory when they fell down from exhaustion. After a brief rest the bear limped away to its den, the hog rising and watching its departure.

The owners of the hog, who witnessed the fight, are doing all they can for the animal, but believe it will die.

## WAS GOOD SAMARITAN ONE TIME TOO OFTEN

NORFOLK, Va., November 2.—Rev. J. W. Gaines, a colored preacher, who had been in the transfer business in Portsmouth for a number of years, at an early hour this morning was struck by a switch engine and killed. The bulk of Gaines' business consisted in his acting the good Samaritan in getting safely home after midnight and later those citizens who had gotten down and out during the evening. He had one in charge when killed. The passenger's injuries were sufficient to awaken him and put him on his feet again. There is an opening for another capable transfer man.

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
