ORDINANCE NUMBER THIRTY-SEVEN

ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT BAWDY HOUSES AND TO PUNISH EXCESSIVE AND KEEPERS THEREOF...

SECTION I. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any room, house or premises in the City of Globe to be used as a disreputable or bawdy house...

SECTION II. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or maintain or reside in or be an inmate of any bawdy house or premises of ill fame within the City of Globe...

SECTION III. The general reputation of the house and the persons frequenting the same shall be the competent and prima facie evidence of the character of the house and the purposes for which it is used...

SECTION IV. Any person convicted of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail for not less than five nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment...

SECTION V. Ordinances Number Thirteen and thirty-three are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NUMBER THIRTY-FIVE

ORDINANCE DIVIDING THE CITY OF GLOBE INTO WARDS.

SECTION I. The City of Globe is hereby divided into six wards, respectively bounded and described as follows, to-wit: The First Ward.—All that part of the City of Globe lying south of Cottonwood Street, extended easterly and westerly to the boundaries of the City...

The Second Ward.—All that part of the City of Globe lying between Cottonwood and Cedar Streets, extended to the east and west boundaries of the City. The Third Ward.—All that part of the City of Globe lying between Cedar and Kline Streets extended to the east and west boundaries of the City...

The Fourth Ward.—All that part of the City of Globe bounded and particularly described as follows, to-wit: Beginning on Broad Street at the point of intersection of Kline Street extended west to the point of intersection of the Old Dominion Switch known as the "High Line" with the G. V. G. & N. Railway; thence northerly along the Old Dominion High Line to the City boundary; thence easterly to the southeast corner of the City of Globe; thence southerly along the east boundary of the City of Globe to the intersection of said boundary with Kline Street extended easterly; thence westerly along Kline Street extended to the east of beginning.

The Fifth Ward.—Beginning at a point on Broad Street in the City of Globe, at the intersection thereof with Cedar Street extended westerly; thence easterly along Broad Street to Blake Street; thence westerly along Blake Street extended to the west boundary of the City of Globe; thence southerly along the west boundary of the City of Globe to a point at the intersection of said boundary with Kline Street extended westerly; thence easterly along Cedar Street so extended to the point of beginning.

The Sixth Ward.—All that part of the City of Globe lying north of Blake Street and the Railroad Switch from Broad Street to the Old Dominion smelting plant.

ORDINANCE NUMBER THIRTY-SIX

ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A FIRE DEPARTMENT IN THE CITY OF GLOBE.

SECTION I. It is ordained by the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of Globe that the Fire Department of the City of Globe shall consist of a Fire Commissioner and a Volunteer Fire Service.

SECTION II. The Fire Commissioner shall consist of the Mayor, who shall be chairman thereof, and two councilmen to be appointed by the Mayor, and the Chief of the Volunteer Fire Service.

SECTION III. The Volunteer Fire Service shall consist of the several volunteer fire companies that may be organized and maintained pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION IV. Upon the petition of not less than fifteen nor more than twenty-five male residents of the City of Globe who desire to organize themselves as a volunteer fire company being filed with the Fire Commission, such Commission shall, if it approves of the qualifications of the petitioners and deems the organization of such company advisable, approve such petition, and issue to such petitioners a certificate of organization, upon said petitioners organizing and electing officers pursuant to the rules and regulations of the City of Globe, and filing with the Fire Chief a certified copy of the roll of said company.

SECTION V. The officers of the Volunteer Fire Service shall consist of a Chief, Assistant Chief and a Secretary, and the officers of each company shall be a captain, foreman and secretary.

SECTION II

Upon the petition of not less than fifteen nor more than twenty-five male residents of the City of Globe who desire to organize themselves as a volunteer fire company being filed with the Fire Commission, such Commission shall, if it approves of the qualifications of the petitioners and deems the organization of such company advisable, approve such petition, and issue to such petitioners a certificate of organization, upon said petitioners organizing and electing officers pursuant to the rules and regulations of the City of Globe, and filing with the Fire Chief a certified copy of the roll of said company.

SECTION III. The officers of the Volunteer Fire Service shall consist of a Chief, Assistant Chief and a Secretary, and the officers of each company shall be a captain, foreman and secretary.

SECTION IV. Each company may admit new members, provided that at no time shall the membership of any company exceed twenty-five; and provided further that no person under twenty-one years of age or of unsound mind or unable to speak the English language shall be eligible to become a member.

SECTION V. On the first Monday of April in each year, the fire companies shall assemble at their respective stations, and elect a captain, foreman and secretary for the ensuing year, and on the third Monday of April of each year all of the companies shall meet at the Council Chambers of the City and elect a Chief and Assistant Chief and a Secretary of the Fire Service.

SECTION VI. The said meeting shall be presided over by the Chief. The officers elected shall hold office for one year from and after the first Monday in May following the election and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SECTION VII. Any member of said company may be suspended or expelled for cause by the Fire Commission.

SECTION VIII. The Fire Commission shall, subject to regulation by the Common Council, exercise authority over all matters pertaining to the Fire Service in the City of Globe, and may make rules and regulations in all matters pertaining to such service, have charge and control of all fire apparatus of whatsoever nature and character, with power to purchase additional apparatus, supplies and equipment and supervise all contracts awarded and work done for the Fire Department. PROVIDED, that they shall incur no liability exceeding one Hundred Dollars at any one time without the approval of the Common Council of the City of Globe.

SECTION IX. All fire apparatus provided by the City shall at all times remain the property of the City. Each company shall receive to the Fire Commission for the property received from the City, and shall be responsible to the Fire Commission for the care and preservation of such property.

SECTION X. The Chief shall be the executive officer of the Fire Service and have command at fires over all members of the service and other persons assisting thereat.

SECTION XI. The Assistant Chief shall have the qualifications and exercise the duties of the Chief in his absence.

SECTION XII. It shall be the duty of the captain of each company to preserve discipline, to require a strict compliance with the rules and regulations of the service, to cause correct rolls of membership to be kept, and to do or cause to be done such other things as may from time to time be required by the Fire Chief.

SECTION XIII. In the absence of the captain, the foreman shall exercise all the duties of the captain.

SECTION XIV. It shall be the duty of each company, under the supervision of the officers, to keep all fire apparatus clean and in good order at all times.

SECTION XV. The different fire companies, pursuant to the fire regulations, shall on every alarm of fire, repair to the place of fire with the apparatus under their care and there work and manage the same under the direction of the Chief and his assistant.

SECTION XVI. No fire apparatus shall be applied to any private use without the consent of the Fire Chief.

SECTION XVII. All fire apparatus in service shall have the prior right of way through all the streets and places of the City of Globe while on fire duty, and any person who shall obstruct the same by vehicle or otherwise, or obstruct any hydrant or prevent the natural flow of water therefrom during a fire or who shall knowingly drive any vehicle across any hose while the same is in use for the extinguishment of fire or inspection purposes, such hose not having first been protected from injury, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION XVIII. Any person or persons wilfully resisting or interfering with any officer or member of the Fire Service in the performance of his duties at a fire shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION XIX. Any person who shall give a false alarm of fire, or who shall wilfully or carelessly destroy or in any manner injure the fire apparatus of the City of Globe shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION XX. Every fireman who shall wear a suitable badge to be provided by the City of Globe, with the name and number of the said fireman's company engraved thereon, and any person wearing such badge unlawfully shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION XXI. All officers of the fire service when on duty shall be vested with the powers of deputy marshals of the City of Globe, and shall have full power to summon a posse to their assistance.

SECTION XXII. Whenever any member of said De-

partment shall become disabled by reason of injuries received at a fire while in the performance of his duties as a fireman so as to be unable to gain a livelihood, the Common Council of the City of Globe may allow such disabled fireman a sum not exceeding fifty dollars per month for a period not exceeding three months, payable out of the funds of the City of Globe.

SECTION III. Any person who shall, for seven successive years, serve as an active member of the Fire Department of said City, and be in good standing at the expiration of such period, shall be entitled to be exempt from further duty in said department, and shall be permitted to enjoy all the privileges of an active fireman and to wear a badge with the word "exempt" and other suitable device thereon.

SECTION IV. All fire companies heretofore organized, may re-organize under this Ordinance by filing with the Fire Commission a resolution of their intention to re-organize under this Ordinance and furnishing to the Fire Chief a certified roll of their membership.

ORDINANCE NUMBER THIRTY-FOUR

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Globe:

SECTION I. That the maintenance of any slaughter house, soap factory, establishment for the steaming or rendering of tallow, lard or offal, and all other places where any noxious, offensive or unwholesome business is carried on within the limits of the City of Globe or within a distance of two miles beyond the limits thereof, shall be unlawful and is hereby prohibited.

SECTION II. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than three hundred dollars, or be confined in the City Jail not to exceed three months, or both.
