BEAUTIFUL TRIBUTE PAID CITY BY A VISITOR

REV. W. P. BUCKNER GIVES HIS IMPRESSIONS OF ARIZONA AND HER PEOPLE

"IF YOU CAN MEET GLOBE ON STALWART MANHOOD, YOU'LL HAVE TO CITE ME"

"My Dear Arizona and Friends, Good-bye, and Yet Not Good-bye Forever, for I Expect to Live Among You at Some Future Time."

Rev. W. P. Buckner of Springfield, Mo., who has been in the city for a number of days visiting his brother, Henry Buckner, left for his home in Missouri yesterday. Mr. Buckner is president of the Springfield district M. E. church south and is a minister of marked ability.

This was Mr. Buckner's first visit to Arizona, and the territory, with its matchless scenery and wonderful resources was so much of a revelation to him that it is probable that he will return and make Arizona his future home. He was particularly impressed with the sturdy, genuine manhood of the commonwealth and in the course of

an interview before departing paid the territory and the people a very high compliment. He said:

"On leaving your beautiful little city, its magnificent scenery—nestled as it is amidst white-winged clouds of floating beauty and mountains of golden treasure, my heart pours forth in gratitude to the God of the everlasting hills for the manhood which I found in Globe and the friendships which I formed are more enduring than time.

"Not long since while passing through Jackson, Miss., on my way to New Orleans, a handsome and splendidly poised gentleman boarded the train. He was one of those thoroughly approachable, congenial sort of spirits one is bound to like. He took pains to tell me all about the principal products and then exclaimed, 'Last (but not least, we produce men.'"

"On leaving Globe today I should like to be seated by my Mississippi friend and say to him: 'If you can meet Globe, Ariz., on the level of stalwart manhood, you will have to cite me. I am from Missouri.'"

"Deeper than the foundation of the mountains and more sublime than their sun-kissed summits are the characters of many of the men I met and these men were rich and poor alike.

"The world is getting better.

"Time is whirling us on to that day when a man will be 'a man for a' that,' wherein no man who has gotten rich either by luck or pluck shall be allowed to trample upon a man because he is poor. I am glad to find this ideal coming more visibly to view from Maine to California. It's line has gone out through all the earth and its words to the end of the world. There is no speech nor language where the voice of this ideal is not heard. The heavens declare it. In them hath He set a tabernacle for the sun, which is as a bridegroom coming out of his chamber and rejoicing as a strong man to run a race.

"Last Tuesday night when I left my dear ones at home and my baby boy

with pneumonia fever, I felt that I was going upon a long journey to a region of blackened cinders and barren mountains, with its stretches of desert wastes, where there was not a bird to sing in its solitudes or a flower to relieve its desolation. But, oh! When our train ran into that more than beautiful Gila river valley, I thought, Can earth afford a more beautiful landscape or a richer soil?"

"And when the train whistled for Globe I looked to meet the sight of a magnificent city. I came in on the local, for our train was late at Bowie. I like those trainmen. I shall remember them ever for their gentility. Some of them may swear, but when they learned I was a minister they treated me with so much respect I was ashamed of myself. I met some of them today and I love them for their manliness. I got off the caboose way up the track from the depot. I came but a little way when I heard music and a song came floating to my heart on this attenuate air; when I stopped to listen it was the voice of a lady, perfectly accompanied as she sang:

"Like a bird on the deep far away from his nest, I have wandered my Savior from Thee."

"It seemed to touch the throne in answer to the prayers of many broken hearts and roll back in sweet strains of peace. Then I said, If I am on land I am in the hands of Him who watches the sparrow's fall; and if on the sea, let the tides wrench and toss me in their obdurate flow; I shall not be moved for faith is an anchor sure clinging to the solid rock within the vale of troubled waters.

"My dear Arizona and friends, good-bye, and yet not good-bye forever, for I expect to live among you some time. And if I do not that which you have found will outwear the bounds of time. It is not gold, neither is it rich valleys; it is the philosopher's stone—manhood—I admire, and I love all the men I met and leave your town with ill will toward no man."

Globe Is in Fine Condition and Everything is Booming, Says a Traveling Man

Despite the fact that much is heard to the contrary, Globe is one of the liveliest towns in Arizona at the present time," said P. D. McRae last night, who returned yesterday after having spent a week in that place.

ANOTHER OIL WELL BROUGHT IN AND FOUR ARE IN SIGHT

THERE IS GREAT ACTIVITY IN THE VIRGIN FIELD OF MCHAVE COUNTY AT PRESENT

WILLCOX, Ariz., November 12.—Another well in the Virgin field has been brought in at a depth of 500 feet. Four more are nearing the sand and will be in the oil stratum within a few days. Eight other wells are drilling and will be completed before the end of the month. These wells are shallow and will prove good pumps, but it is thought that should they be driven into the third sand big spouters would be struck. With a number of wells showing possibilities of the oil field will come tankage and other necessities of the field. Recorder McNeely this week received advices from an oil man stating that he had traced the field four miles wide and ten long in this county, and that a rig could be put in and a well sunk on this belt to demonstrate its possibilities for a small amount of money. He says that a better blossom shows on this side of the line than on the other. It is possible that a company will be organized here to make locations and sink a well.

PITTSBURG DAY LIKE NIGHT

School Children in Panic When Fall Falls Over City

PITTSBURG, Pa., November 12.—A meteorological phenomena was observed here today. The darkness during the morning became so great that panic ensued in nearly all the public schools. The teachers had the children stop their recreations and sing to keep up their courage.

At 8:15 o'clock this morning the sun was shining brightly; at 8:20 darkness settled like twilight; at 8:45 the blackness had spread like a black helmet over the city, and at 9 o'clock one could not see across the street, in spite of thousands of lights that had been lit. At 9:14 the clouds began to fade away, and at 10 o'clock the sun again shone its brightness.


