TUCSON ABSCONDER HID IN MOUNTAINS

Missing Railroad Clerk Writes a Penitent Letter to Officer

R. HERBERT WOULD COME BACK AND MAKE GOOD

INTENDED TO RETURN BUT PUBLICITY GIVEN SHORTAGE FRIGHTENED HIM

ASKS AGENT HUMPHREY TO PAVE THE WAY FOR HIS RETURN TO OLD PUEBLO

Letter and Request Have Been Turned Over to the Auditing Department and Action Will Be Deferred Pending Their Final Decision.

PHOENIX, November 14.—R. R. Herbert, the former Southern Pacific ticket clerk in the uptown office, who mysteriously disappeared more than a month ago and who was afterwards found to be short in his accounts, has been heard from. Herbert is staying in the mountains near Redington, about 25 miles east of Tucson in the Rincon district.

Herbert, repentant for his misdeeds, has written to District Freight and Passenger Agent E. G. Humphrey asking if it is not possible that his shortage can be squared up in some manner.

The young clerk, who went wrong, states in his letter, that he now sees that he was a fool and that he was following a course which must always lead to ruin. He says further that after he fled from Tucson he had fully intended to return again and face the situation, but that his courage failed him after the news of his shortage had become known to the public.

He adds that he is willing to do anything to settle the matter and requests earnestly that means be devised by which he can square matters. He states that he is willing to return to Tucson immediately if he is wanted.

Mr. Humphrey, when seen today stated that immediately upon receipt of the letter from Herbert revealing his whereabouts, he turned the communication over to the auditing department of the Southern Pacific and the matter is now in their hands.

Mr. Humphrey added that further investigation of Herbert's affairs had revealed that his shortage is about \$700. It had been thought at first that the shortage was only about \$400.

No warrant has ever been issued for Herbert's arrest as the auditing department of the Southern Pacific has not as yet turned the matter over to the surety and guarantee company which holds Herbert's bond. The delay was due, Mr. Humphrey stated, to the fact that Herbert has wealthy relatives and it is thought that they may possibly make good the shortage.

Herbert's disappearance more than a month ago was very cleverly contrived. He left Tucson early one Sunday morning stating that he was starting on a hunting trip. He failed to return and nothing definite was known regarding his whereabouts until his letter came.

fessing his misdeeds and begging a chance to make good was received by Mr. Humphrey. Herbert's home is in Los Angeles and he came to Tucson from that city nearly a year ago.

BOARD OF HEALTH ISSUES BULLETIN

Gila County Visited Frequently By Stork--Pima Leads in Deaths

Secretary Coleman of the Arizona board of public health, is sending out the first printed quarterly bulletin ever issued in Arizona. It is a neat little folio and gives much information regarding proper sanitation and suggestions as to how contagious diseases may be checked and stamped out. The vital statistics for the quarter ending September 30 are given as follows:

Pima has a higher percentage of deaths than any other county in the territory and is closely followed by Maricopa. The large number of deaths in these two localities is explained by the fact that many "lungers" from the east crowd these counties. Cochise leads in the percentage of births, with Gila in second place. The stork seldom visits Mohave county.
