## BIG FIRE AT TUCSON TUESDAY DOES DAMAGE AMOUNTING TO \$35,000

### Shops and Foundry of Gardiner, Worthen and Goss Entirely Destroyed

Fire which was discovered Tuesday morning at 4 o'clock, completely destroyed the plant of the Gardiner, Worthen & Goss company at the head of Congress street opposite the new Southern Pacific depot in Tucson.

Practically the entire plant was destroyed and the loss is estimated at from \$35,000 to \$40,000. The insurance on the machinery and building of the company will amount to about \$10,000. The company employed about thirty-five men and they are thrown out of work at the present. It is supposed the fire originated from a heater in the building.

The blaze was first discovered by night watchmen in the Southern Pacific yard and the first alarm given when an engineer of one of the switch engines on seeing the blaze, tooted his whistle continuously for about five minutes.

In the meantime some person had entered into the Ramona hotel and called the fire department. The fire bell was rung and the department responded.

Fire Chief Schofield had been notified by telephone and, leaping into his coat, he hurried to the fire. He arrived there in advance of the firemen. A number of the firemen were shortly afterwards and two of those were attached to the hose carts in that vicinity. The water pressure was excellent, but the flames made such headway that it was impossible to save the building. All attention was directed to saving the life, as much as possible, and to preserving the adjoining lumber yard of the Tucson Lumber company from being destroyed.

When it was seen that the flames were making rapid progress and there was a possibility that the Southern Pacific depot might catch fire, the shop whistle was blown and the Southern Pacific fire squad responded and they also attached a hose to one of the hydrants and three streams were kept on the blaze.

The firemen, after they arrived at the scene of the blaze, did excellent work and despite the fact that the big lumber yard and several small oil tanks were just a short distance away they managed to confine the blaze to the Gardiner, Worthen & Goss company building.

From what can be learned the fire started in the office of Mr. Worthen, which is just off the main office, and it is the supposition that it started from a gas heater. There is a possibility, however, that it might have been caused by mice finding matches in the room and igniting them.

There was no one in the building after 8 o'clock and it is quite probable that the fire smoldered for some time before it broke out so that it could be seen from the street.

Owing to the fact that the building was quite old and everything was very dry, the flames spread very rapidly and when the fire department arrived on the scene the entire plant was in flames.

Mayor Slack, who is secretary of the company, stated that no action would be taken by the company looking toward the erection of a new plant until B. L. Worthen, who is one of the chief stockholders, returned from his trip to the northern part of the territory. He stated that it was probable, however, that a temporary structure might be put up on the present site until a new location can be secured outside of the city.

Fire Chief Schofield is conducting an investigation regarding the reported delay of the fire department in reaching the scene of the fire and will likely make a report to the council at the next meeting.
