**CLAIMS DID NOT
KNOW GIRL WITH
WHOM HE ELOPED**

EIGHTEEN YEAR OLD FRANK ROBINSON DENIES THAT HE TOOK FRANCES LOGAN TO JEROME WITH HIM

NEITHER WILL AGREE TO SETTLE MATTER BY MARRIAGE AND BOTH REMAIN IN CUSTODY AT PHOENIX

Boy Is a Son of Jerome Postmaster, Who Gave Girl Job in the Postoffice, Where She Was Arrested by the Phoenix Officers—Result of a Chance Meeting at Territorial Fair.

Denying that he knew Frances Logan was even going to Jerome, or that he had anything to do with her trip from Phoenix to that city until after she arrived there, Frank Robinson, aged 18, occupies the woman's cell in the county jail there and will remain there unless released on bond until his preliminary hearing next Monday morning before Justice Johnston.

Robinson was arraigned before Justice Johnston Thursday morning on a charge of rape, and his bond fixed in the sum of \$1,000, which it is possible his father, who is postmaster in Jerome, may arrange to give. His preliminary hearing was set for Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

Deputy Sheriff Jeff Adams brought Robinson and Miss Logan to Phoenix Thursday morning from Jerome. The boy was placed in a cell and the girl taken home by Deputy Adams, where she spent the night. There is some talk of placing her in the Crittenton home until the outcome of Robinson's case is settled.

Strange as it may seem, both Robinson and Miss Logan are strongly opposed to settling the affair by a marriage. She tells the officers that she wants to either make her home in Jerome or go back to the Benson reform school, where she was an inmate for several months.

Miss Logan wants to go almost anywhere but back home. She tells a story of cruel treatment by her father, and says her object in fleeing to Jerome was to avoid going back to her home in Bisbee with her mother, who brought her here for the fair.

Robinson was this afternoon arranging with Attorney Walter Bennett, an old friend of his father, to take charge of his defense. He stoutly maintains his innocence of any wrongdoing, and says he will prove his innocence. In this the girl substantiates.

According to the story Robinson told through the bars of his cell door this afternoon, he met Miss Logan through a mutual friend in Phoenix last Tuesday, never having seen her before in his life. They spent the days and evenings of fair week together, masking for the carnival last Friday night.

Robinson says he parted with her Saturday evening and did not see her again until Sunday morning, when he got off the train at Prescott to go to Jerome. He denies having bought her railroad ticket and says that on the trip to Prescott she occupied the Pullman car and he rode all the way in the smoking car.

Upon their arrival at Jerome he tried to persuade her to return to her parents, but she refused after telling him she intended to get a position and earn her living in Jerome. Robinson admits to having rented a room for her for two days.

Robinson took the girl to the home of his parents, and after explaining matters to them, they said she should have a home with them as long as she wanted it. To assist her Robinson's father gave the girl a position in the Jerome postoffice, where she was found by Deputy Sheriff Adams.

Robinson denies that they went to Jerome together or that there was any sort of an understanding between them that she should join him there.

Asks to explain his being found in the room with the girl by the officers in Jerome, Robinson said that he had just taken her up to see his parents, and that he was bringing her back to her room. He says that when the officers

entered he was sitting in one chair and she in another.

Several witnesses will be brought from Jerome to give testimony in the case. The testimony of the couple who spent part of carnival night with Robinson and the girl will probably be called upon. Robinson said this afternoon that he parted with her about 10 o'clock on carnival night.

Asked finally if he would marry the young lady, Robinson said emphatically that he had done nothing which obliged him to make her his wife.

**PRISONERS ESCAPE
BUT SOON RETAKEN**

FOUR MEN, ONE OF THEM A MURDERER GO OUT OF TOMBSTONE JAIL DOOR—TWO ARE RECAPTURED WITHIN AN HOUR.

Wednesday morning a jail break occurred at the Cochise county jail in Tombstone and four prisoners made their escape. An investigation showed those who got out were highway robbery committed in Lowell about a year ago by holding up and robbing one Harry Palmer; David Villisnor, indicted on a charge of murder, alleged to have been committed in Douglas a few months since; Harry Jones, indicted on a charge of grand larceny from Douglas.

Within an hour after they had made their escape two of the prisoners had been recaptured. William Williams and the Mexican, David Villisnor. The former was captured by George Brodge about a mile and a half from town, making his way up a small ravine toward Charleston. He made no resistance and was brought back to town and landed in jail again. The Mexican was caught by Deputy James Davis in the gulch back of the court house and about a half mile from the jail.

The prisoners made their escape by crawling through a small wicket in the door leading from the inside of the jail to the outside corridor. This was accidentally left open by Jailer Butler. Guard Landers was on the inside of the jail with the prisoners. He had just made his rounds about the jail and went into the toilet and was in there a few minutes. The prisoners had been let out of the cells, as is customary, just previous to having their breakfast, seeing that the wicket was open and knowing that Jailer Butler went to his breakfast about this time, and they made a rush for the wicket and four of them had crawled through when Guard Landers came out. He got in front of the door and kept any more from getting through. Butler had gone to breakfast and as the prisoners came out through the wicket they had only to run through the corridor through the jailer's office into the courtyard and climb over the brick wall and make their escape down the railroad track. The door leading from the office to the jail yard had been opened but a few minutes before by Jailer Butler.

Sheriff White was in Bisbee at the time of the break and was notified by telephone. He immediately took the train as far as Hereford, where he secured a horse and rode across the country to head off the fugitives should they come in that direction.

About 2:15 a telephone message was received at the sheriff's office from the Critchett ranch, about a mile below town, that a man answering the description of one of the prisoners had passed by there going down the gulch. Deputy Ned White and A. W. Howe went down in that part and had soon captured Harry Jones, another of the fugitives, leaving but one of the prisoners out, Perry Jones.


