



### IN ARIZONA

At the 400-foot level in the Holbrook shaft in the Bisbee district, R. S. Wood, a miner, lost his life Wednesday morning as the result of a cave-in. When the body of Wood was recovered the only visible injury was a broken leg. Wood lived until he reached the Copper Queen hospital, where he expired a few minutes afterward.

The E. P. & S. W. railroad will have a city ticket office in the Gadsden hotel at Douglas.

Wood costs \$15 a cord in Tucson this winter. Costs a few dollars less in Globe.

J. H. King, Southern Pacific agent at Huachuca Sidings, has been appointed to the agency at Yuma, vice J. T. Clayton, who is agent at Doming, N. M.

The Bonita Copper company, operating a group of claims in the Lone Star district, north of Safford, is installing a steam hoist. The new shaft is now down eighty feet.

Gila valley ranchers are holding alfalfa for a \$12 price and refuse to sell at any lower figure.

Rev. B. M. Johnson has been assigned to take charge of the Methodist church south of Solomonville. The church building is to be greatly improved.

Martin Pima, convicted at the last term of the Graham county court of murder in the second degree, has appealed his case to the supreme court.

The Arizona Copper company has paid \$43,245.90 and the Detroit Copper company \$28,522.56 into the Graham county treasury in the shape of taxes.

Bishop W. A. Moody of Thatcher is doing up his business affairs and will soon return to the Samoan Islands.

Gray's dog and pony show is to start Saturday November 29.

The Sonora railway has now day and night service. Passengers can now leave Tucson in the afternoon and arrive at Guaymas in time for breakfast.

Mrs. Marshall Field Jr. is having search made for her brother-in-law, Harry Buck, who was sent to the territory some time ago with enough money to keep him away from his rich relatives.

Fair Commissioner Packard says the fair was a financial success and predicts that \$3,000 will remain after expenses are paid.

The following notice has been posted by the Tucson banks: "From and after this date, all or any part of deposits made with the undersigned banks in gold or currency, may be drawn in like funds, at any time, at the pleasure of

the depositor, there being no restriction or limitation on this class of deposits."

**Jackass Commits Suicide.**  
This is the story of a sentimental jackass and its suicide.

The jackass was owned by John Boies, a neighbor of Ernest Thompson Seton, at Cos Cub. It had a friend and companion a dog which was killed today by a trolley car in front of Mr. Boies' house.

The jackass witnessed the tragedy. Evidently its nerves were unstrung. A little later, when another car came along, the desolate jackass leaped over the fence in front of the car and perished. The car was derailed.

The Seton Indira tribe, composed of neighborhood boys are so certain that the jackass, in its grief for the death of its friend, committed suicide deliberately and did not merely seek to derail the car out of revenge, that they will attend the funeral of the jackass in a body today.—Greenwich (Conn.) **Hunter's Misfortune Proves Gain.**

"Jack" Gardner, of Montclair, went up to Hibernia, in Morris county, to shoot yesterday, and returned today, with eighty-seven rabbits, all of which, he says, he shot himself, the direct result of spraining his ankle. He shot every one of the bunnies while sitting on a fallen log near a hole in the rocks of the mountainside. The local sportsman arrived at the hunting ground before daybreak. While scrambling over the rocks one of them turned under his foot and wrenched it so severely that he could not stand on it. While he was regretting the fact that his sport was ended a rabbit, then another passed him. He says that for more than an hour he loaded and fired as rapidly as possible, and the dead rabbits lay in profusion around him.—Montclair Dispatch to the New York Tribune.

### ARIZONA SCHOOL TEACHERS WARM UP TO THE SCRAP

**SUPERINTENDENT OF TUCSON SCHOOLS DEFENDS HIMSELF AGAINST CHARGES MADE BY TERRITORIAL CHIEF**

**HAD SUFFICIENT WARRANT FOR ADDING NEW TEXT BOOKS TO COURSE PRESCRIBED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD**

**Special Session of the Territorial Board of Education Will Probably Be Called to Settle Disputes Among the Educators of the Territory.**

Whether or not the books for the city schools required outside of the regular course prescribed by the territorial board of education and which Territorial Superintendent of Education R. L. Long states were added illegally, will be ordered out of the course, says the Tucson Citizen, and the prescribed books used instead, will be a matter for the territorial board of education to decide, in the event Superintendent Long adheres to his declaration that he will file charges with the board regarding the text books used in this city.

Mr. Long stated to Superintendent Ruthrauff of the public school today that he would report the extra text-books used here to the territorial board.

In the event that the board sustains Superintendent Long's charges it will mean that all the books not included in the regular printed list sent out by the territorial superintendent would have to be replaced by books in the regular course.

Superintendent Ruthrauff when seen today said:

"The books that have been added to the school course are supplementary to the others and make the course more efficient. There are very few of the regular books which we are not using. Mr. Long erred in part yesterday when he said that we do not use the Progressive Fourth Reader and the Modern Music Book Alternate Third. Another book he mentioned is Stoddard's Mental Arithmetic. This is in the course, but it has not been used for a number of years.

"In selecting some supplementary books I thought I was perfectly justified in view of a communication which I had had with Principal A. J. Matthews of the Tempe Normal school as well as a talk which he made at a meeting of the Territorial Teachers' association in Phoenix last fall. At

that meeting there was a general discussion of courses of study and Mr. Matthews stated that he was of the opinion that cities like Phoenix, Tucson and Bisbee should have additional courses, as the regular list prescribed by the territorial board was intended for the rural districts."

Mr. Ruthrauff then showed a letter which he had written to Mr. Matthews on April 2. This letter referring to the textbooks states:

"Since the matter of selecting textbooks has been placed in the hands of the board, would it not be possible for them to make some provision for such cities as Tucson, where we are dealing with mixed population, to outline the course of study, and if necessary select textbooks needed, subject to the approval of the board."

In his reply Principal Matthews stated:

"It will probably be necessary for us to adopt one series of textbooks for the territory, but it may be possible for us to arrange the matter pertaining to cities like Tucson, Phoenix, etc., by supplementary lists. The matter of arranging a course of study should in my estimation be conceded to the city schools and I am sure that there will be no objection to it by any member of the board of education."

Superintendent Long to prove to the local board of education his contentions about added textbooks, went with the board to the different schools today.

He will likely make his report of the investigation immediately after his return to Phoenix, and it may then be necessary to call a special session of the territorial board of education.
