

# GLOBE TROTTER LETTER ARRIVES

### LETTER MAILED IN NORWAY THIRTY-THREE YEARS AGO IS FINALLY DELIVERED IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, November 29.—"And a letter that he longed for came at last," said John A. Neilson, on January 9, 1875, John A. Neilson, the home of his parents in far off Norway, decided he would write a letter to his brother Tom, who was captain of the good bark Harmonia, at Minoteton, Mexico, some time after the opening of the year. John Neilson had had happened in the neighborhood—how another brother, Nicholas, had broken a leg, and been sent to the hospital; how this or that friend had been married or gone over to America; how certain new babies had arrived in town, and what families they were attached. Mrs. Cassidy seized the opportunity to include a picture of her own in the same envelope—a thrifty soul, who believed in saving the pennies.

**Begins Long Journey**  
The envelope was addressed to Captain Tom Neilson, in care of the Sweetmeat at Minoteton, Mexico. That was the beginning of a long and dangerous journey for the letter—which received yesterday by Captain Tom, carpenter on the United States revenue cutter Manhattan, stationed at Battery.

Captain Tom and John and Nicholas are all here now and have been for years. Brothers John and Nicholas are also in the revenue service and the cutter Manhattan.

The postmarks on the letter show the message went to the Mexican coast to which it was originally addressed. Captain Tom changed rapidly from one sailing vessel to another, and postal authorities were not able to keep pace with him. It went nearly four times to Brother John at Gramstadt, and four times Brother John sent it again, determined that if the letter were good for anything he was going to have that letter reach his brother if it took a lifetime.

Finally Captain Tom became tired of the chase and sought to settle down. He held the position he holds today,

and has been stationed at New York ever since. During all these years the letter has been floating around the world, being swatted with a postmark at intervals. Fifteen of these marks can be traced on the envelope. There were many more, but they have been blotted out.

**The Journey's End**  
The letter was opened at times by postal officials, who returned it to John. The freshest foreign stamp was placed there in Gramstadt on June 26, 1907. That is the last trace of its wanderings until Captain Tom received it yesterday. The old man and all his relatives were greatly surprised and delighted.

When Captain Tom went into the revenue service he brought his wife across the sea, and told his brothers to come along as fast as they could. They had forgotten all about the missing letter till a postman boarded the cutter yesterday and handed it to Captain Tom. The news it contained was a trifle stale, but it made good reading just the same.

# ITALY'S KING IS THIEVES' VICTIM

**EARTHQUAKE FUNDS WASTED BY ADMINISTRATORS AND RICH ROB THE POOR**

ROME, November 29.—Disgraceful revelations respecting the misadministration of charitable donations to the Calabrian earthquake sufferers' fund of 1906 are made public today through a leakage of the facts contained in the report of the parliamentary commission appointed last year to inquire into the matter. Only fifteen copies have so far been printed, for private circulation in cabinet circles, because the government feared that the publication of the report would seriously affect the inflow of subscriptions for the victims of the latest upheaval.

Lengthy extracts from the report printed in the responsible organs of the press attribute some of the worst abuses to the confusion which reigned at the moment, as well as to the primitive isolation of many of the affected hamlets over the vast earthquake region.

**Stores Looted by Rich**  
In many places, while the genuine needy sat stupefied and weeping beside the ruins, where their families and friends lay dead or dying, the official storehouses were literally sacked by savage throngs of well-to-do individuals utterly unaffected by the catastrophe, who bore off all the clothes and bed coverings. In other places, with the guilty connivance of the local mayors and municipalities, the construction of shelters, who were to be paid at the rate of \$100 per shelter for the accommodation of five families, charged as having provided for twenty families who, so that in all such cases eighteen families went absolutely destitute.

Again, wealthy landlords, pretending eagerness to join in the philanthropic work, threw open their vacant properties to the homeless, and after contriving to get their premises stocked with public goods, sequestered these under lock and key, and on the plea of the imaginary damage to their buildings came upon the funds to the tune of 10 francs apiece per day for wretched rooms of an actual rent value of 20 francs a month.

**Work on King's Sympathy**  
Extraordinary tricks were resorted to by local hunches to work upon the feelings of King Victor Emmanuel so as to obtain larger grants. Sham subjects were hired over large areas to come to pack to their utmost capacity those hospitals which the generous-hearted monarch was to be taken to visit, while at the entrance of a certain town a huge factory was actually demolished in fantastic fashion for the purpose of arresting the attention of the royal visitor.

These and similar frauds brought to his knowledge just after the late disasters, in proof sheets of the report, are said to be the true secret of the king's sudden change of purpose after he had already announced his intention to visit Calabria.

**Heard His Own Funeral Sermon.**  
Thomas Pattee, a man about seventy-two years of age, and a resident of Morrison, Iowa, who had some doubts about his recovery from an operation to which he was about to submit, conceived the idea of having his funeral services held before the operation. He declared that if he did not get through all right they wouldn't have to hold services and he could hear what they had to say about him. He, accordingly, had the hour for services set for 11 o'clock a. m., on Tuesday, and one of the ministers located in Morrison held the services.

Mr. Pattee was in bed ready for the operation after the services were over. At the close of the services he called the doctors and told them that he was ready.

It is reported that the operation was successful, and that Mr. Pattee is doing nicely. Should he recover, he will enjoy the distinction of having listened to his own funeral sermon.—Des Moines Register and Leader.
