SPENT MONTH IN WILDS OF OLD MEXICO

INTERESTING TRIP THROUGH THE PINACATE MOUNTAINS BY PARTY OF SCIENTISTS.

FOUND MUCH NEW INFORMATION REGARDING PLANTS AND ANIMALS HERE.

Five Hundred Volcanic Craters Discovered From a High Peak on the Mountains—Many Interesting Discoveries Made By Party.

New discoveries among the craters in the Pinacate mountain range and the finding of new animal and plant species were the rewards for the month's trip which a party of scientists received on their journey into the wild and largely desert portion of northwestern Sonora, says the Tucson Citizen.

The members of the party were Dr. W. T. Hornaday, director of the New York Zoological park, Hon. J. M. Phillips, game warden of Pennsylvania, Dr. D. T. MacDougal of the Desert Botanical laboratory and Godfrey Sykes, the engineer who is connected with the Carnegie institute at Tucson.

The members of the party left here early in November and have just returned from their hard trip. They made the journey as far as possible in wagons and then continued their trip on horseback.

They entered Mexico at the port of Nogales and returned by the same port. They had been provided with passports which gave them unusual privileges. These passports were issued by the Mexican government through the request made by President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Elihu Root.

Among the plant discoveries made the chief one was the finding that the Saguaro which is the biggest cactus that grows here, extends clear through to the Gulf of California.

When the Pinacate mountain range was reached the party was able to mount a high peak and from that point they could see 500 volcanic craters.

The most remarkable one was three and one-half miles in circumference and 750 feet, with a flat bottom one mile across. This enormous crater is in the shape of a bowl and its walls are so steep and smooth that there is but one place where it is possible to make a descent into it.

It is the opinion of the scientists that this was one of the last of the volcanoes in that section to be in action and they state that it would not be surprising if it should break forth again at any time.

Measurements were taken of the mountains in that section and it was shown that the maps previously prepared had given the mountain ranges too high. Cobabi peak, south of Sonoyta, is but 4,000 feet high, while it is given as 9,000. The other highest peaks are only about 4,000 feet above the sea level.

The trip was made solely in the interests of science and much data was learned regarding the habits and distribution of both animals and plants. The members of the party were able to secure specimens of mountain sheep, lions and other animals. The heads and skins will be sent east and after being mounted will be presented to the National Collection of Heads and Horns of New York, the Carnegie institute in Pittsburgh and the Smithsonian institution in Washington.

During the trip Mr. Sykes established a walking record for one day across the sand dunes. Carrying his food and water for the day as well as surveying instruments, he left the party camp in the Pinacate mountains at sunrise and tramped to the gulf shores and returned all in one day. The distance is forty-two miles.

Planned in New York.

It was learned yesterday that Senator Joseph Benson Foraker, when in this city about ten days ago, held secret conference at the Waldorf Astoria with John C. Spooner, formerly senator from Wisconsin; Senator Winthrop Murray Crane, of Massachusetts and numerous leaders of his party in New York. It was then decided that Senator Foraker would make the double announcement of his presidential aspirations and his withdrawal from the race for re-election to the senate.

State Senator Martin Saxe said yesterday: "If it were not for the fact that New York will present its own favorite son to the national convention, Senator Foraker's candidacy undoubtedly would attract favorable consideration here. But the issue between President Roosevelt and Governor Hughes is rapidly becoming too sharply defined to permit New York Republicans to consider seriously the announcement of the presidential candidacy of anybody from another state. Until that issue is met squarely and settled there will be little hope of an outsider enlisting support in this state. I am convinced that Governor Hughes is New York's first choice and that nobody can defeat instructions for him."—New York Herald.

BY HARD WORK INDIAN MAKES LARGE FORTUNE

PABLO LIJARO IS SAID TO BE THE WEALTHIEST REDSKIN IN THE COUNTRY.

HE IS WORTH \$75,000 AND HAS ONE OF THE FINEST RANCH HOMES IN ARIZONA.

A Full Blooded Papago, He Severs His Tribal Ties and Turns His Attention to Modern Agricultural Life.

TUCSON, Ariz., December 7.—Fifty head of cattle were brought into Tucson the early part of this week from the ranch of Pablo Lijaro, which is located about thirty-five miles west of Tucson.

The cattle were brought into the city by two Papago Indians in the employ of Lijaro, and part of the proceeds of their sale was invested in two new farm wagons for Lijaro's ranch. Pablo Lijaro, owner of the ranch, is one of the few full blooded Indians in the territory, who, although no more civilized than a great majority of his race, has made a success in following in the footsteps of the white man and is now independently wealthy.

Lijaro, although a full blooded Papago, has in a measure severed his tribal ties and has, by hard work and long hours, amassed a fortune variously estimated at from \$30,000 to \$75,000. His home, as fine as any ranch house in the territory, is situated at the foot of Cayote mountain, in the Barbaquivera range, and his lands stretch for miles in all directions.

Lijaro has immense herds of cattle grazing upon his land, every foot of which has been fenced, and also has many acres of ground under cultivation, raising all the farm truck used by himself and family and also markets a good part of it in Tucson.

Lijaro and his wife live on the ranch, and two daughters, his only children, are attending school in this city. People from this city who have visited the Lijaro ranch say that it is a model one, conducted along up-to-date lines. Lijaro has a number of horses of fine blood, and it is said that he has the finest buggies and wagons on his place that can be secured in the territory.

Lijaro has between thirty and forty square miles of land under fence, the greater part of which is used as a range for his cattle. The balance is under cultivation and crops of all kinds are grown with great success, principally by dry farming.
