

ELECTRICAL POWER FOR TWO COUNTIES

THE FALLS IN CATARACT CANYON TO BE HARNESSSED BY A BIG CORPORATION.

TO FURNISH POWER AND LIGHT FOR TOWNS OF MOHAVE AND YAVAPAI COUNTIES.

Three-Quarters of a Million Will Be Spent on This Great Enterprise—Work To Be Commenced at Once—No Trouble to Finance Scheme.

PRESCOTT, December 7.—W. M. Nellis, of Mayer, took over, under bond, yesterday, from W. I. Johnson the title to the Cataract canyon water rights, located in Cataract canyon, about sixty-eight miles north of Seligman. The execution of the bond was the beginning of a deal to finance a large corporation, which will install an electric generating plant, capable of furnishing electrical power to the mines and furnishing light to the industrial centers of the counties of Yavapai and Mohave.

"I estimate that it will cost at least \$750,000 to install a plant and transmission lines to the towns and cities of Yavapai and Mohave counties," said Mr. Nellis to a newspaper man yesterday. "The main transmission line will be built either through Seligman or Ash Fork. A conservative estimate places the water flow of Cataract canyon at 5,000 miners' inches. The locations cover three falls, one of which is 160 feet in height.

"I will be on the ground with an engineer corps to start the preliminary surveys about December 12. Active work of grading for the installation of machinery, the building of roads and houses, will be commenced early in January."

Asked if he did not anticipate trouble in financing such a large proposition on account of the disturbed conditions of the eastern money markets, Mr. Nellis said: "The money market conditions will not interfere in any way with the carrying out of the project. Eminent engineers have made careful estimates of a number of water sources with a view of installing a similar plant to furnish electrical power. In this county and Mohave in the last two years. Such power will find a ready sale on account of the high price of oil and other fuels. Provided the water volume of Cataract canyon is sufficient to develop the reported power, I do not hesitate to state that its falls will be harnessed with electrical machinery before the close of the year 1908."

Mr. Nellis has sold a number of mining properties in this county during the last two years, and is very enthusiastic over this, his latest project.

Delay in Divorce.

"The underlying reason why so much time usually elapses between the filing of petition and the hearing or trial in divorce proceedings is not generally understood," remarked a lawyer who makes a specialty of this character of practice. As a rule, judges are inclined to afford ample time for domestic partners to ponder well before pursuing further toward legal redress for matrimonial difficulties. 'Divorce in haste and repent at leisure' is a logical paraphrase. Of course, if after mature reflection a different opinion does not ensue, the average jurist would favor progressing the suit."—New York Press.

FLAMES DESTROYED MERRICK RESIDENCE ON NOFTSGER HILL

The residence of Frank Merrick on Noftsger hill was completely destroyed by fire about 6:30 o'clock last night, together with the contents. The origin of the fire is unknown. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

During the absence from home of Mr. and Mrs. Merrick last evening between 6 and 7 o'clock flames were discovered breaking from the second story windows. An alarm was turned in, but the flames made such rapid headway that the services of the department were of little avail, exceptin the protection of adjoining property. A small fire had been left burning in the kitchen, and it is the belief of the firemen that the blaze started from a defective flue. The house was a two-story structure, the first story being of brick and the second of wood.

THE WILD BALSAM APPLE.

Its Seed Holders Are Suggestive of Luce Purse.

In the brooks of autumn in certain places many little lacelike bags may be seen drifting along with the current or stranded by the shore. They are the inner coats or bodies of the wild balsam apples (*Echinocystis lobata*) which have dropped from the vines overhanging the stream and now float lightly away with their large seeds.

The green prickly bag of the balsam apple itself began to form in late summer, and by autumn it has withered and faded to a pale straw color. We may see the trailing vines with their shrunken pods decaying the brookside bushes far into the winter. The outer coat of the pod, gradually rots away, and the inner bag or seed carrier is now released and exposed as a delicate, webby network of tough fibers. A thin skin or membrane fills up the space between these meshes, but that also falls away through the action of water and the winter storms until only the half-like tissue of the "purse" is left. These little purses, being extremely light and buoyant, float far and wide over the submerged swamp lands in late autumn, carrying the seeds with them and so planting the vine in new situations. If, however, we take these seeds home with us and plant them there, Mother Earth will suitably reward us in the following year with vines of our own. They will spring up and spread rapidly until all the stone walls and garden fences are decorated with the tracery of their stems and star shaped leaves.—St. Nicholas.

Chills and Hot Baths.

Hot water bathing is beneficial in counteracting the effect of a chill. First, it undoes another mischief worked by the chill. The latter has sent too much blood internally, so risking congestion. Heat brings the blood to the surface. Heat is not life, but it is one of the factors of life. Indeed, dissolution always occurs when the internal bodily temperature is greatly lowered. Heat will not keep a body alive and great heat will kill it. In many morbid states of the system, as rheumatism, hot baths are of great service. Warm baths are useless. The heat should be as great as can be borne without pain.

Richelieu as an Editor.

The first reporter of France was Louis XIII. The National library possesses the manuscripts of thirty-six articles written by that king. Almost all are accounts of his military operations. These articles were published in the Gazette de France. The "copy," however, did not go directly to the printer. Louis XIII. wrote abominable French, and he had vague notions of orthography. His articles were corrected and often entirely rearranged by a secretary named Lucas, who copied them, sending to Richelieu the new manuscript. Richelieu examined it in his turn and often introduced additional corrections. At the siege of Corble the king wrote a few lines eulogistic of the cardinal, but afterward crossed them out of his article. Richelieu wrote them in again, and so they appeared in the Gazette de France.—Revue de Paris.
