THE NEVADA SITUATION.

While complying with the request of Governor Sparks that troops remain at Goldfield, President Roosevelt again took occasion to say some pertinent things to the Nevada governor. The governor, apparently overcome by his wish to see United States regulars remain in Goldfield, seemed to have lost sight of the legal aspect of such an act and the president did not mince his words in laying down the law to the governor of the desert state. In addition to the fact that it took him nine days to compose a telegram in answer to the first one from the president, the governor seems to be something less than an ordinary weakling. He complains to the chief executive of the nation that the state legislature of Nevada is a bad acting bunch, or words to that effect, and that he is just about almost certain that they would refuse to do their duty even if he told them in plain words just exactly what it was.

As to the countermanding of the order for the withdrawal of troops, the president could hardly have done anything else upon the representations made him, and their continued presence for three weeks in the mining camp, does not mean that the president has withdrawn from the position he made so plain to Sparks ten days ago. They will leave at the expiration of that time, whether or not the legislature acts in accordance with the governor's desires, as there will be no necessity for them if a ranger company is authorized, and it will be unconstitutional if the legislature does not assert the state's sovereignty.

PRINCE OF MONACO'S MISTAKE.

There will be no execution in the principality of Monaco, as Madam Gould, who was condemned to be headed for a most atrocious murder, has had her sentence commuted to life imprisonment. The commutation was granted not because of any feeling of mercy for the murderer, but because of the bad effect which the execution of a woman would have on Monte Carlo, the greatest gambling resort in the world. The Prince of Monaco, who guides the destinies of the Riviera resort under the protection of France had it put up to him strong, that the place would suffer greatly in a financial way if the madam had her head chopped off, and as the prince gets a big rake-off from the games in the Casino, he consented to the commutation. Monte Carlo still has its running list of suicides, caused always by losses at the gaming tables, but those form a part of the usual schedule of life at the gay resort and their effect is only momentary, but the execution of a woman was too much. It is a far cry from Arizona, but it looks to us as though the royal ruler of the Casino had blundered. The beheading of one woman or a half dozen of them even in public, would not have a restraining effect on those who are crazed with the lure of the green cloth, the clicking of the ivory ball and the monotonous intoning of the croupier.

GAINS WIPED OUT BY LATE SELLING

Stocks Open Well, But Sell Off at Close; Old Dominion Drops a Point.

The gains in both the New York and Boston markets of Friday were in many instances wiped out by the final selling yesterday afternoon. The opening of the market was strong, but the brisk advance inaugurated on the preceding day was not pursued with confidence. The decline in the currency premium, however, gives solid ground for satisfaction. An Associated Press dispatch from New York states that the deficit was reduced to \$20,170,350 as against \$54,103,600, the maximum deficit for the week ending November 23.




