WHAT ONE YEAR'S GROWTH MEANS IN A LIVE CITY

EL PASO, Texas, April 25.—Just a year ago the chamber of commerce published a booklet for advertising purposes and for giving information to inquiries about the city and the southwest. At the time the booklet was published, the official figures and estimates were all up to date. A few of the books remain on hand and are still being sent out. But so great has been the growth of the city in the past twelve months that the book has to be quite thoroughly revised before being used at this time.

The 1907 book states the assessed valuation of the city of El Paso as \$15,000,000; it is \$25,000,000 this year.

The book states the population of El Paso as 40,000; it is no less than 45,000 now.

The tax rate then was 2.86 per cent; this year it is 2.55.

Bank resources are given in this book as \$8,000,000 and deposits as \$6,000,000; but each total should be increased by over \$1,000,000 to bring the figures up to date.

The latest building records given in the book are of the calendar year 1906, \$1,000,000; last year El Paso erected and equipped about \$2,500,000 worth of new buildings, and the amount of official permits was over \$2,500,000.

The number of school teachers is given in the book as 110; now it is 140. The public schools then occupied nine buildings; now they occupy eleven. School property was then valued at \$500,000 and has now increased to \$700,000.

In 1907 there were sixteen religious denominations with twenty-five churches and missions; there are now twenty denominations with forty-five churches and missions.

Postoffice receipts given in the book for the calendar year 1906 were \$78,000; last year they were \$108,000.

The estimated cost of the Rio Grande reclamation project as given in the book was then \$7,200,000; it is now \$8,200,000.

The Leasburg diversion dam had not then been completed; it is now in use.

The number of telephones in El Paso in 1907 was four thousand; it now exceeds five thousand.

The year 1907 meant a tremendous leap forward in all lines, and this year's record will not be behind.

El Paso taxpayers are about to vote for a bond issue of \$500,000, the proceeds to be used as follows: \$300,000 for street paving; \$100,000 for new public school buildings and sites; \$100,000 for street grading; \$50,000 for a sewage disposal plant; \$50,000 for a garbage disposal plant.

El Paso's municipal budget this year will exceed \$400,000, and the city is rapidly developing in every direction.

PRINCESS LOUISE IS SUEED COUNT CAN'T GET JEWELS

PARIS, April 25.—Poor Princess Louise of Belgium is in trouble again. This time Count Festetics, an Austrian noble, is suing her for repayment of money lent. The sum advanced to the impetuous and disowned daughter of Leopold II was about \$20,000, and the princess has only managed to pay half of that amount.

The count is hardly likely to get much satisfaction, for the attempted distraint on the jewels of the late Queen Marie Henrietta, the princess' mother, seems to have been definitely shelved. However, both Louise and her sister, Stephanie, have great expectations from the private Congo estate of their royal sire when the latter dies.

Both princesses are past mistresses in the art of spending money, but there is this difference between them, that while Stephanie has in Count Lonyay a rich though despised husband, her elder sister not only has no husband to pay her debts, but cannot even get her yearly allowance out of her stony-hearted papa.

University Place Church of Christ Organizes Youngsters DES MOINES, Iowa, April 25.—University Place Church of Christ is to have a Boyville. It will have its Boyville community, its bank, officers and general affairs incident to such a community.

A. at Marshalltown, as boys' secretary for this church. This summer the boys in the church will be organized for outdoor sports and this winter for gymnasium work. Incidentally there will be a library and Bible class. This Boyville will be the first of its kind to be instituted in Des Moines.


