YET ANOTHER MODEL TOWN

IRON COMPANY TO BUILD IT IN MICHIGAN, SAYS ANNOUNCEMENT

Artistic Houses Are to Be a Feature—Space Around Each Cottage for Vegetable and Flower Gardens—Lawns to Be Screened from Public.

ESCANABA, Mich., April 25.—In the iron mining region, where the Escanaba river and its east fork unite, was a year ago a tract of sparsely wooded pine barren and densely wooded river valley land, all wild. Here, where one track of the Munising railroad was the only evidence of human habitation and where deer, bear and beaver made their homes, is now the town of Gwin, built by the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company, by direction of its president, William G. Mather.

This town has a sewer and water system nearly completed, roads and sidewalks cleared and graded and houses erected for five hundred persons, stores, station and other houses under way, and contracts made by which the town's area may be doubled and its housing capacity increased ten fold.

The town site was selected in September, 1906, with the advice of the company's landscape engineer, Warren H. Manning of Boston, who designed the town in all its details. His assistants, Charles H. Pratt and Arthur K. Harrison, staked out the townsite. In early spring contracts were let.

Upon a ledge near a memorial pyramid at Negaunee an upturned stump with gaunt prongs is all that remains of an ancient tree that by its fall revealed in 1844 the hoard of iron, development of which has given employment to thousands of men that populate the towns of the region. Four miles south, at Ishpeming, in the side of an elliptical Jasper hill, a narrow cleft marks the spot where ore was first discovered there and the beginning of the operations of the Cleveland Iron company. This, the next to the oldest mining company in the state, was organized in the early fifties and consolidated in 1891 with the Iron Cliffs company to form the present Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company.

In trying to improve the educational and social conditions of all the towns in which they are interested, the company's officers, officially or individually, are giving constant encouragement to country clubs, social clubs, churches and schools. The company has found this general welfare work for the community so desirable that it has employed Wil-

liam H. Moulton to promote such work.

Living Improved

Under this management this company has greatly improved living conditions in the towns in which he has interests, which now extend far beyond the parent town. Landed possessions have been extended to include mineral ranges and land with good timber, which is essential to mining. It has acquired control of the Munising railroad, which connects its mines with the Marquette dock. It has a fleet of its own ore boats, hauling from Grand Island, opposite Munising on the mainland. This Grand Island possession of the company, eight miles long, three and one-half miles wide, with lakes, cliffs and primeval woods, has been stocked with hardy American and many European game quadrupeds and birds.

In the older towns of Ishpeming and Negaunee special pains have been taken to lead miners and their families to improve their home surroundings. This work was begun by the offer of prizes for the best kept front yards and gardens.

It was in 1899 that Mr. Mather engaged Mr. Manning as the company's landscape designer. Under his direction plants for a company nursery were selected and planted at Negaunee. The list included many species not generally cultivated in the section, most of which have proved satisfactory.

In Ishpeming two reservations, comprising approximately forty-five acres, have been established adjacent to Mr. Mather's home grounds. One of these reservations includes one end of a high ridge, covered with the only growth of timber in the town. Here turf-wood roads and trails have been established, leading to the "picture gallery" at the end of the ridge, the picture being formed by opening vistas through the tall growth in such a way as to frame a series of distant and near-by outlook points ranging from southwest to east. This reservation is used by children as a playground and by their parents for picnics. Through it many miners pass daily to and from their labors in the mines.

Mr. Mather's property forms a connection between this woodland reservation and another about the pit at the original workings of the company, where the surface is excavated to form an irregular cavity nearly sixty feet deep, with picturesque broken walls. These walls, their summits and a sandy slope on one side of the Jasper hill, where the original discoveries of iron were made, have been planted with white pine. The native growth of red berried elder, maple, birch and poplar are being encouraged.

Gwin, the new town, has an area of one square mile. For the most part the land slopes toward the rivers, affording good drainage. The main Escanaba river flows by the town on the westerly

side, and the east branch flows on the south, or front side, while two other streams take an irregular course across the site and lead diversity to the landscape.

Streets Wide

The main streets have a total width of eighty feet, with a planting space between two roadways, and on each side about sixteen feet wide. Other streets are sixty or forty feet wide, with a central roadway. The streets running northeast and southwest are named after rocks or minerals, and those going at right angles after trees or shrubs. An important feature in constructing a new town is the sewer and waterworks. From the first this matter has been carefully superintended at Gwin and a splendid system is being installed. House connections are made to lot lines when sewer and water pipes are laid, to avoid the necessity of digging up streets and walks.

A pumping station with a capacity of 2,000,000 gallons daily has been built on the main Escanaba river, where the water has been found to be of the purest.

One of the most striking and individual features of Gwin will be expressed in its buildings. A special effort has been made to design a variety of artistic dwellings which would be low-priced and use space economically, and at the same time be suitable for homes in this location. Gwin can now boast of fourteen different designs of cottages. They are one and a half stories high, contain four to six rooms and are of stone and wood. Their artistic features and variety will give Gwin an individual appearance compared to the usual mining town.

Space has been left around each cottage for flower and vegetable gardens, and also streets by shrubs. This will make the town more attractive and give unlimited pleasure to the miners and their families. These houses and lots are to be sold to the miners on the co-operative plan, so that they may eventually own homes of their own.

A station is to be erected at this point of meeting of the three radiating main streets of the town. The tower of the station will form the terminal points of these streets.

An abundant public reservation area has been provided for and ample space reserved for school buildings and playgrounds. The public reservations take in the steep bluffs on each side of the river and the bottoms of these valleys that are flooded during brief periods of high water. While the flooding makes the land unavailable for building purposes, it does not impair its value as a place of public recreation. In fact, conditions of moisture and protection here presented have resulted in the development of a luxuriant forest growth of great beauty.
