BILLY ROBERTSON IS BOUND OVER, \$3,000

TESTIMONY SHOWS THAT HE HAD BEEN KNOCKED DOWN WHEN HE FIRED.

Slayer of Rancher Wayne Pursley at Safford Pleads Self-defense and Gives Bond, as Fixed by Court—Other News From Valley Town.

SAFFORD, September 21.—Billy Robertson, who, when attempting to arrest Wayne Pursley, last week, shot and killed him, was given a preliminary hearing Saturday and bound over to the grand jury in the sum of \$3,000, which he furnished.

It was brought out at the hearing that, when called on to surrender, Pursley replied that he did not propose to go to jail until after he had attended to the knife wound inflicted by Campbell, but that he would go afterwards, and he asked the marshal to wait. Robertson replied that he could not wait and insisted that Pursley come at once, whereupon the rancher rushed upon him and knocked him down, the marshal firing the first shot while on the ground. Robertson's plea is self-defense.
