

**ANOTHER BIG SALE IN BOUSE DISTRICT**

**J. C. DENTON DISPOSES OF THE DUTCHMAN GROUP TO CALIFORNIA CAPITALISTS**

BOUSE, Nov. 4.—It was intimated a few days ago when the announcement of the sale of the Little Butte group by Bouse and McMahon, the original locators, was made that a second important sale was made on the tapis. It has been concluded and the first payment made. The transaction has been conducted with extreme secrecy, but it turns out that the well known Dutchman group was the ground that passed in yesterday's sale. This group contains a large acreage and is considered by many as the best ground in the camp. Both sales were negotiated by Col. J. C. Denton of Bouse a former Goldfield operator and a promoter who knows how to swing a deal. This makes the second large sale in the camp this week, both negotiated by Col. Denton, who is systematically interesting a wide circle of his mining acquaintances in Nevada, Colorado and Los Angeles, in the merits of this great young copper property. His work is appreciated by the miners of Bouse-camp many of whom have more property than they are able to develop actively and are delighted to find that Col. Denton is able to deliver the boom which all summer he has promised them for this fall and winter. He states that he will be able before midwinter to conclude a dozen large sales in the camp to capitalists whom he has already interested, but who are reluctant to make commitments until after the election. But Bouse feels that two big sales in one week are pretty good for a starter for a boom. It is understood that Col. Denton has taken over these two splendid copper properties for a syndicate of heavy Los Angeles operators, who will spare no money in crowding development.

**SPEEDING MOTOR CAR HAS RACE WITH DEATH**

**GRIM REAPER WINS AFTER THE CHAUFFEUR HAD MADE A REMARKABLE RUN.**

TUCSON, November 4.—Speeding along at the rate of nearly a mile a minute, the race of an automobile with the Grim Reaper was lost Saturday, when Guthrie Randall Smith, a prominent resident of New York state, passed away in the machine only a short distance north of Tucson. Death was due to asthma, from which Mr. Smith had been a sufferer for many years. He was 35 years old. His remains were sent on Sunday morning to Birmingham, N. Y. Mr. Smith had been in Oracle but a short time. He had gone there in the hope of securing relief from his asthma. On Saturday morning he suffered an unusually severe attack and it was hurriedly decided to bring Mr. Smith to Tucson for medical attention. A big touring car was secured and the race with Death from Oracle to Tucson was begun. The chauffeur, realizing that to save Mr. Smith's life it would be necessary to get to Tucson as quickly as possible, put on all power and sent his machine along the Oracle road at a sixty mile an hour clip. However, despite all that could be done, Mr. Smith expired when the auto in which he was riding was about two miles north of the city. Had he lived until he reached this city, it is believed his life might have been saved.

**MANY AFFLICTIONS OF THE FAMILY OF JAMISON**

**A PROCESSION OF TROUBLES FOR FAMILY AND FRIENDS OF PHOENIX MAN**

**Mrs. Olewine and Mrs. R. H. Wilkinson Both Badly Injured by Falling—Mrs. Olewine's Mother May Not Recover from Illness.**

PHOENIX, Nov. 4.—The old saying that misfortunes never come singly was never more appropriately applied than in the case of J. M. Jamison, his relatives and friends. In a recent issue there was performed the painful duty of chronicling the death of Mrs. Jamison.

Mr. Jamison and Mr. Jamison's sister, Mrs. Olewine, accepted the hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Wilkinson as a temporary abiding place. It was the more to their liking for the reason that Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Wilkinson, parents of H. B. Wilkinson, were on the same train coming here to be with their son, that Mrs. Olewine was, her mission being to minister to her sister, and Mrs. R. H. Wilkinson and Mrs. Olewine became well acquainted.

Mrs. Olewine was quite nervous Saturday night and sometime after midnight Mrs. Wilkinson in her behalf went to the stairway in the rear of the house to summon a maid. She slipped on the stairs, and falling cut some ugly gashes in the scalp, one wound severing an artery. Dr. Plath was summoned, and arriving quickly, held the artery while additional help was called to assist him. By the time another doctor arrived, Dr. Plath's hand had become numb, but they were able to stop the flow of blood and prevent the death she narrowly escaped, though she is still in a dangerous condition.

Last evening Mrs. Olewine fainted on the stairs in the front part of the house, and falling broke her right arm on the upper third of the humerus, near the shoulder. It could not be determined last evening, owing to the inflammation, whether or not the shoulder is injured, but in any event it confines her to the house.

This, it would seem, was sufficient affliction for one household, but there are yet other things that add mental distress. The home of Mrs. Olewine is Buffalo, and her mother, now 87 years old, has resided with her there for twenty years. Some weeks ago she went to Phillipsburg, Pa., to visit the family of a son and was taken quite sick. Mrs. Olewine went to her bedside and when she improved returned to Buffalo just three days before she left for Phoenix in response to a message from Mr. Jamison. Almost at the same time her mother in Pennsylvania was taken worse and another sister who resides in Michigan left at once for her bedside in Phillipsburg. Yesterday morning Mr. Jamison received a letter from the sister in Phillipsburg stating that her mother was gradually sinking, and it was quite likely before the letter arrived he would receive a message announcing her death.
