Building Work Stopped— One of the disagreeable effects of the wet weather has been to stop work on practically every building in course of construction which had not been roofed over.

Improving Electric Service— The electric light company is improving its street lines and service in the business district, taking down the small transformers and replacing them with larger ones, which will effect an economy in the distribution of the electricity.

New Postage Stamps— The new issue of postage stamps will shortly be placed on sale here. The denominations are of 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, 13, 15 and 50 cents and \$1.00. On the one-cent stamp is the head of Benjamin Franklin in profile from Euclid's bust. The border designs of all the denominations are identical, the head being an ellipse on end, with laurel leaves on either side. The size of the stamps is the same as those in use heretofore.

Mean Crossings— Street Superintendent Floyd Blevins has been having a hard time of it with the street crossings for the last two days. Several loads of gravel were laid along the crossings in order to afford better footing to pedestrians, but the drizzling rain continued and it was not long before the new crossings were covered with slush, about as deep as on the rest of the street.

Chicken Thieves Active— Complaints of chicken stealing are coming in lively. A dozen fine fowls were stolen this week from the City Meat market, the thieves cutting through the coop, and the very next night a dozen chickens and a half-dozen ducks were lifted from the coop of Mrs. Montgomery, back of the Iris theater.

Old Timers Will Dance— Preparations are being made by the Old Timers for a grand ball to be given at Clark's pavilion on the night of December 2. The affair, which will bring together all of the old residents of this city, and vicinity, promises to be one of the most interesting and pleasurable of the season. Cases Set for Trial— Judge Nave has set for December 2 the case of the territory against Sam Richmond and TA24 Escholle. The latter is the Indian who fired five shots at one of his tribesmen on the reservation a couple of weeks ago and concluded to surrender after having vowed that he would make his last stand at his tepee door.

To Be Sentenced Monday— Jerome Edwards, the young man who was convicted of criminal assault on one of his cousins, will be sentenced by Judge Nave Monday. Sentence was to have been pronounced yesterday, but owing to the fact that the district court was busy all day with the trial of John Sanford, the negro charged with the murder of W. Green, the matter was deferred until next week.

Litigants Compromise— The suit of W. B. Kelly vs. C. E. Kelly for recovery of \$10,000 alleged due as commission for selling some mines to the Globe Consolidated company, was dismissed in Judge Nave's court yesterday, the matter having been compromised by payment to the plaintiff of \$4,500. The suit of W. W. Cohn vs. Frank Morgan, was also dismissed.

Sent to Federal Court— Judge Nave yesterday dismissed the case against Albert Evans, charged with felonious assault on an Indian girl. District Attorney L. L. Henry informed the court that he had been informed that the crime was committed on the White Mountain Indian reservation, and Judge Nave announced that the district court was without jurisdiction in the case. The case will be taken up by the federal authorities.
