No Clue to Gasoline Mystery in North Globe Saloon

Not the slightest clue as to the identity of the man who entered the Balkan saloon Monday night and filled the stove with gasoline has been discovered, and all hope of ever solving the mystery has practically been abandoned.

Martin Despot, one of the proprietors already mentioned, gave it as his opinion yesterday that the motive of the strange affair was either to play a fool trick and annoy the members of the firm, or a blundering attempt to kill him and wreck the place. Despot and Fred Dickson denied yesterday that even so much as a couple of gallons of gasoline had been taken from their place.

"We only had a half-gallon of gasoline in the storeroom," said Dickson, "and that was still there when John Puhara, the third member of the firm, opened the door and looked over the saloon. Whoever turned this fool trick must have brought the gasoline with him."

Still another mysterious feature of the affair was the manner in which the gasoline got into the cuspidor which blazed up in the afternoon when a match was dropped into it by a customer.

When the reporter visited the saloon Tuesday afternoon, the floor had been drenched with water, Puhara having opened all the doors and turned a hose into the place until he had washed out every vestige of gasoline. Both Despot and Dickson said yesterday that all of the gasoline had been poured into the stove, filling the box-like bottom of it

and running out over the floor, which it soaked for a space of about ten feet around, but that there had been no gasoline thrown anywhere.

This theory was that the gas from the oil had impregnated the water in the cuspidor and caused it to flame. This was disputed yesterday by some of the most competent chemical men in the city.

The cuspidor had not been used to pour the oil into the stove, for after a little oil had been burned from its surface, the bottom still remained covered with a couple of inches of water.

The only thing clear about the whole business was that a great quantity of gasoline had been smuggled into the place from the rear alley and that the fumes detected by Mrs. Pasqual Nigro in her room overhead must have reached through the floor, for there is no stairway inside the building and the stove pipe leads out through the side wall and not into any flue opening in any of the second floor rooms. Nobody has been able to explain where the gasoline was procured, nobody has seen it carried into the rear alley from which the stove was entered, and, in fine, nobody knows anything.

But the neighborhood has been considerably agitated by the occurrence. Only a few feet from the stove full of gasoline were several bottles of whiskey, and if Despot had failed to detect the smell of gasoline when he entered the saloon in the morning and had dropped a match into that stove, the explosion and resultant fire would have played havoc in North Broad street.

ATTACHMENT CLOSES HOP DEN

Cleverly Concealed Opium Joint Discovered Above North Side Chinese Restaurant.

The closing of the Chinese restaurant run by Hong Loey in North Broad street yesterday, when Constable Duncan served the proprietor with a writ of attachment, revealed the existence of a rather neatly concealed "hop joint" which would never have been suspected. In the rear of the place hung a ladder, close against the wall, leading to a trap door in the ceiling. The officer was on the top rung in an instant and found a complete opium smoking outfit, with sundry smells that indicated that the matte tank had been tapped quite recently. The ladder was removable, so that the smokers could easily pull it up after them and close the trap door, and a skylight in the roof served the double purpose of affording ventilation and a ready means of escape if the police happened to discover the secret den and crowded up from below—that is, provided the pipe had not been hit too hard.

GOVERNOR DOESN'T LIKE JAPS

Nevada's Executive Says He Would Like to Have Them All Deported—More Dangerous Than Chinese.

CARSON, Nev., February 3.—Another Japanese resolution that was amended yesterday did not come into the assembly this morning, but has been ordered engrossed as amended. In the amended form it will pass the assembly. Governor Dickerson gave out the following on the subject: "Personally, I would like to see the Japanese expelled from this country and every one of them now here deported. I regard them as being a worse evil and a greater menace to our country than the Chinese. I am not in favor, however, of enacting laws or passing resolutions on this subject that will tend to embarrass the national administration."
