NEW DREADNAUGHTS MONEY DON'T COUNT SAYS JEFFRIES OF FIGHT

FOUR OF THEM ARE PROVIDED FOR IN ENGLAND'S NEW NAVAL BILL.

LONDON, March 12.—The British naval estimates, which were issued tonight and show an increase of close to \$15,000,000 over the estimates of last year, possibly will fail to please the big men of the navy, but they fully prove that it is the government's determination to keep pace with other naval powers, and that no halt is likely to be called in the international competition for superior naval armaments.

In addition to four new Dreadnaughts the government seeks the power to start building, if necessary, in 1910, four additional large armored vessels.

GRAFTED MONEY FOR POLITICS

Republican Manager Required Percentage of Employees' Wages for Campaign Purposes

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Charged with soliciting political contributions from federal employees, "on or about April, 1907," Ulysses E. Glick, statistical secretary of the National Drainage association, and former manager of republican state headquarters, was arrested today.

He was held in \$4,000 bail for a preliminary hearing March 18.

The warrant was sworn out by John G. Boyle, secretary of the civil service commission. It is understood that Doyle found from the testimony of some federal employes that Glick solicited 2 per cent of their salaries for political purposes, to be paid quarterly.

HAWAIIAN ISLANDS VISITED BY STORM

HONOLULU, March 12.—A terrific storm swept the district of Hamakua, on the northeast coast of Hawaii, tonight. Twelve inches of rain fell in as many hours, causing heavy damage to plantations and roads in the district. Only meager reports of the storm have been received by wireless, and the extent of the damage is not yet known.

GENERAL STAFF LOSES CONTROL OF JAP ARMY

VICTORIA, March 12.—Control of the Japanese army has been transferred from the general staff to the war office, according to advices received by the steamer Empress of China.

The change was made during the revision of official organization of the army, based on the lessons of the war with Russia, when the general staff held complete control of the army.

LITTLE ROCK, March 12.—The house late today killed the Bowick-Whittington racing bill, which provides for racing at Hot Springs under direction of a commission. The vote was 54 to 14.

SHOT THROUGH BODY MEXICAN MADE NO COMPLAINT

DISCOVERED WHEN TAKEN TO COUNTY JAIL AFTER RIDE FROM MIAMI.

Shot through the body and sentenced by Justice Barnett of Miami to fifteen days in the county jail for fighting, B. Garcia, a Mexican, was brought to the city last night by Deputy Sheriff Spoon, the driver of the Miami stage. Late yesterday evening, word was received from Miami, following an investigation set on foot by Sheriff J. H. Thompson, that the Mexican who shot Garcia had been arrested and would be sent to town today.

No details of the affair were given to the sheriff's office, nor to any of the local officers.

Garcia, under a sentence of fifteen days, was simply loaded on the stage and ordered taken to the county jail. After the manner of the lower classes of Mexicans, he made no statement in court at Miami, nor would he say who shot him. In fact, none of the officers at Miami knew at the time that he had been shot.

It was only when nearing Globe on the stage that Garcia opened his shirt and showed a small, round wound on his left breast to the driver.

"Stab!" laconically queried Spoon.

"No, gun," answered Garcia, as briefly.

"What kind of a gun?" asked the officer.

"Shot gun," mumbled the Mexican. "He was shooting at me and I hit him with a big rock." And then he buttoned up his shirt again and seemed to give the matter no more thought.

When Garcia was admitted to the county jail, however, it was found, as he was made to take the initiatory bath, that he had been shot through the body, the bullet entering the left breast a little below the heart, and ranging upward, emerging through the middle of the shoulder blade. Another bullet had gone through the fleshy part and muscles of his upper left arm.

The man uttered never a word of complaint, refused to speak to the officers of his trouble, and it was only through the attention of the other prisoners that it was learned that he was so badly hurt.

The county physicians, Drs. Wilson & Wiley, were summoned and lost no time in attending to the man's injuries.

That Garcia could stand such injuries with such fortitude and strength is considered as nothing short of miraculous.
