## ARIZONA NEWS AND COMMENT

### Forger Back in Jail

Jim McCormick, who has just finished a term at Yuma for forgery, is again an inmate of the county bastille. He was arrested by the sheriff's office for forging the name of Lin Orme to a check for \$10. Mr. Orme's name is very frequently used by penmen, it appears. Either his signature is very easy to counterfeit or the check artists are pretty sure he has plenty of money in the bank, or both. If Mr. McCormick is anxious to get back to the pen he has gone about getting there systematically and scientifically.

### Realized Big Sum

For \$52,000, the consideration being the largest that has been involved in a business transaction in Phoenix for several years, R. W. Spears has transferred a half interest in the Phoenix Wood & Coal company, together with its subsidiary holdings, to the People's Ice & Fuel company. Joseph Aldrich, who owns the other half of the Phoenix Wood & Coal company, retains his interest. It owns property in all parts of Maricopa and some outside. Spears has been a resident of Phoenix for the past twelve years, coming here after five years spent in Globe and Bisbee in mining. He was first engaged in the furniture business here and later went into the fuel business.—Democrat.

### Wheat Corner Affects Arizona

The price of flour is soaring as the result of the Patten corner in wheat, and the consumer in Arizona is not to escape the consequences any more than the breadwinner in other parts of the country. The Phoenix bakers have taken the initiative by reducing the weight of the five cent loaf from 13 ounces to 12 ounces, and making the ten cent loaf two ounces lighter. In justification of the cut one baker said: "I have never paid so much for flour as long as I have been in the bakery business. The reduction which we have made in the size of our loaves does not compensate for the increase in the cost of flour." The best grades of flour which sold three months ago in Phoenix for \$3.25 and \$3.35 per hundred are now selling for \$4.35 and may go higher, if the price of wheat does not come down soon.

### Street Talk

Says the Courier: Street talk now dwells upon who is the probable successor of Judge Sloan, and in this connection there is a faint whisper of suspicion in certain quarters that Hon. R. E. Morrison, instead of having gone to Cananea, as first announced may have hid him to Washington.

### Prescott Summer Resort

The proposition to advertise Prescott systematically as a summer resort for Arizona people, which was advanced by the Courier in a recent issue is taking hold of the progressive business men of the town and there is now but little doubt that it will be done. Mr. Paul P. Hastings, general freight and passenger agent of the S. F. P. & P. thinks well of the proposition and assures the business men of his earnest support of the proposition. Prescott has a delightful summer climate.

### A Stiff Sentence

Convicted of conducting a disorderly house, William T. Dutton of Yuma, was sentenced by Judge Campbell to five months in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$300. In administering a scathing rebuke, the judge asked Dutton if he realized that he had perjured himself and ordered that the charge of perjury against Dutton be brought before the next grand jury. This perjury charge is based on the fact that one year ago Dutton pleaded guilty to conducting a disorderly house and renting rooms to women for immoral purposes, and that while on the witness stand during the progress of his recent trial, he testified under oath that he had never rented a room to an immoral woman. Other defendants indicted for the same offense of which Dutton has been convicted find themselves in deperate straits.

### Yuma's Oldest Resident Dead

Alexander Berry, the oldest citizen of Yuma in point of residence, passed away peacefully last Wednesday morning, and was buried the following day, old Colorado river steamboat captains acting as pallbearers. The deceased was a master mariner, and during the 42 years he resided at Yuma had followed steamboating on the Colorado. He was born in Glasgow, Scotland, seventy-nine years ago.

### Ranches Bring Good Prices

A Dudleyville correspondent of the Florence Blade says: "A wave of prosperity is about to sweep the old town off its feet. Twelve thousand dollar ranch sales are now common occurrences. Peter Winkelman has sold his ranch for \$20,000; Romero, his ranch for \$10,000; Padilla his place for \$12,000 and the storm is not yet over. Every day you see a hack going up the river with home-seekers in it, stopping at every ranch and inquiring of the owner what price he wants for his land.

### Inspector Webb Transferred

Captain George T. Webb, inspector in charge of the Tucson branch of the immigration service, will soon become a resident of California. Captain Webb has been endeavoring for some time to secure a transfer to California and he has finally been successful. He will be a mounted inspector in the immigra-

### HOMESTEADS MAY BE MADE TO EMBRACE 320 ACRES

ACT OF CONGRESS IN EFFECT THROUGH BALLINGER'S AP- PROVAL OF TERMS.

Much interest is manifested in this section in the approval by Secretary Ballinger of the regulations under which 320 acres of arid land may be taken up instead of 160 acres as heretofore.

The regulations provide for the making of entries for 320 acres of land of non-mineral, non-timber, non-irrigable public lands in the above named states and territories.

Non-irrigable land is construed to mean land which as a rule lacks sufficient rainfall to produce agricultural crops without the necessity of resorting to unusual methods of cultivation such as dry farming.

Lands containing merchantable timber, mineral lands or lands which may be irrigated at a reasonable cost from any known source of water supply may not be entered under this act, and no one entry shall embrace in the aggregate more than forty acres of land susceptible of irrigation from natural sources.

Lands which are subject to entry under this act will be designated as such from time to time and lists thereof sent to the register and receiver of the proper local land offices. Until such lists have been received by the local land officers no application to enter will be received.

Entries must be in reasonably compact form and in no case exceed one and one-half miles in length. Entry men for lands heretofore entered of a character which would bring them within the provisions of this act may (if final proof has not been made and upon the classification and designation of their lands as falling within the provisions of this act) make an additional entry, the aggregate of both entries not to exceed 320 acres.

Proofs must show that at least one-eighth of the area of the entry has been continuously cultivated to agricultural crops, beginning with the second year of the entry and continuing to date of final proof. The law prohibits the commutation of either the original or additional entries made under this act.
